Mobile Home Living Workshop Scheduled

People planning to attend the educational workshop "So You Want To Buy A Mobile Home" should preregister at the Malheur County Extension Office at 889-9129 this week, according to Helen Conner, Malheur County Extension Home Economist. The three meeting series will be held at the Malheur County Library on February 15, 17, and 24 at 7:30 p.m.

Among features of the 1st meeting will be a panel of people who live in mobile homes and a mobile home park owner discussing what they like and dislike about mobile home living. A new film from the Mobile Home Manufacturers Association will also be shown. Stipulations will be used to point out things owners should consider when selecting a site for a mobile home.

Guest speaker at the meeting on February 17 will be Walt Matson, Oregon State University Extension Service Engineer, who will discuss mobile home construction and suggest items the average person should look for when choosing a mobile home. Mr. Matson will also draw on his own experience since he also lives in a Mobile home. Mrs. Conner will talk about livability and design in mobile homes at this meeting.

The third meeting on Thursday February, 24 will include a panel of local businessmen discussing financial considerations. Robert Pierce, Malheur County Assessor will explain changes in Oregon Tax laws that affect Mobile home owners. Other topics included will be "Care and Maintenance of Mobile Homes and Cost of Mobile Home Living."

There is no charge for the workshop which is being sponsored in the county by Oregon State University Extension Service.
