The people of Adrian wish to take issue against the idea expressed by George A. Gurr of the Bureau of Land Management about the Succor Creek Highway.

Adrian citizens feel the need of the Succor Creek highway. Gurr doesn't seem to know or be aware of the amount of traffic that would come through Jordan Valley and have northern Oregon, Washington or even Canada for their destination. Many people of Jordan Valley would find shopping areas in Nyssa, Ontario and Vale comparable or more suitable than those in Idaho. We, in Adrian, have gas, oil, drygoods, groceries, hardware, lumber and many everyday needs.

This has been a needed road for so many years and we feel disgusted to have a new comer to the area tell us we don't need it.

Millions of dollars have been spent on bridges and roads to every accessible stream and fishing hole in western Oregon but all the beauty and wonder of our Succor Creek Canyon doesn't merit a highway? — we think it does.

Just what environmental problem does Gurr have in mind? Ranchers will be able to drive their kids to the school bus in a car instead of a 4 wheel drive vehicle. Is that an environmental problem?

Oregon would have been wise to have built this highway through Succor Creek before Idaho ever built highway 95 and would have been receiving the benefit from it for the last 2 or 3 decades. Why continue without it when facts and figures show we need it and over the years it will justify the money spent on it.

True, they may run parallel for a ways, but many truckers would gladly miss Trucking hill — ask them.

Musical To Be Presented

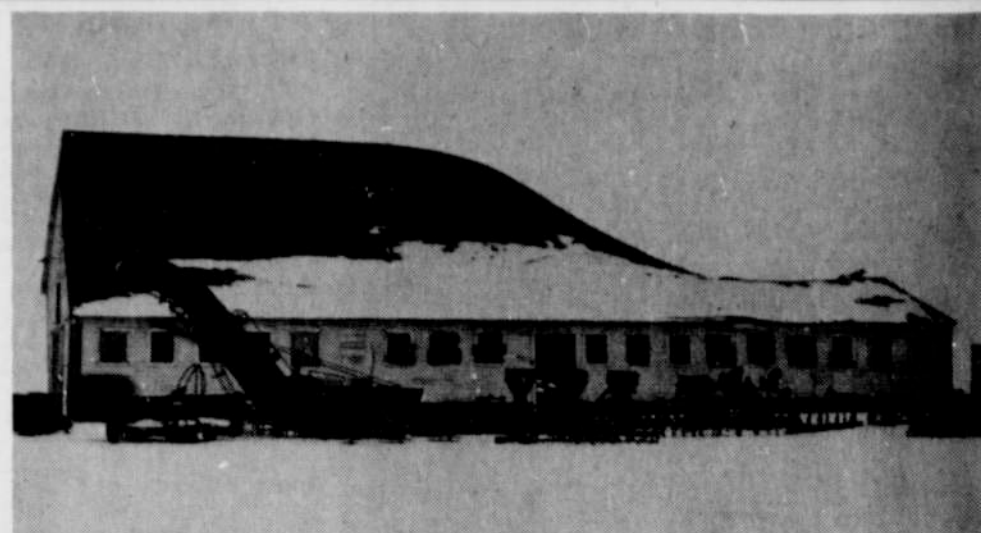
