This contest judged by Nyssa School Superintendent Walter McPartland is conducted yearly and is judged on the achievement of each 4-H Gun Club member.

Advancement in the 4-H program, record keeping and advancement in N.R.A. firing program were considered in the contest.

She was accompanied by Ray Kozak, executive secretary of the Oregon Dairy Products Commission.

The two ladies were introduced Monday evening at a dinner in their honor at the LaPaloma Cafe in Ontario. This is the first trip to this part of the state for the dairy princess, who is now attending Portland Community College.
