Oregonians Answer Dec. Questionnaire

Three out of every four Oregonians participating in Senator Bob Packwood's December questionnaire believe that wage and price controls should be extended until inflation is checked.

And two out of every three believe the government should subsidize health policies so everyone is protected against catastrophic illnesses.

On air, water and land pollution, 70 per cent thought federal laws should be enforced if a state falls behind minimum standards, and 65 per cent believed mining should be banned in all wilderness areas.

Although 50 per cent of those responding to the poll seemed to think the government should subsidize general health policies for those that cannot afford them, only 34 per cent thought the government should provide general care for everyone. But 65 per cent indicated that all employers should provide health insurance for their employees.

On "no fault" auto insurance 63 per cent favored the "no fault" plan and 30 per cent were opposed. Fifty-eight per cent believed all child care expenses should be made tax deductible as a business expense, while 33 per cent were opposed.

Fifty-eight per cent of those responding believed a President should be allowed to serve two consecutive four-year terms as now provided by law. Twenty-two per cent favored a six-year term; 7 per cent thought one four-year term was enough and 9 per cent indicated there should be no limitation on terms.

Area Students Await Results

Students were interviewed by the Ontario Elk's Scholarship Board for their annual Elk's scholarship, Saturday, February 19 and are now waiting for the announcement February 24 of this winner.

The students are judged on a 1000 point basis which are scholarship, leadership, financial need, activities in and out of school, etc. Each student will receive \$25 just for participating and the winner of this district will receive a scholarship which value at this time has not been announced.

Thursday (today) evening all the students and their parents are invited to the Elk's Lodge where the boy and girl who won in this area will be announced. They will then be eligible to go to the district meet which will be held in Klamath Falls and if place there will be eligible for the state meet and finally to the national's.

The Lodge pays expenses going to the meets and provides a chaperone for the students.
