

Favorite Foods

Seafood is an excellent food, nutritionally. Sometimes we want to dress it up and at the same time stretch the budget dollar. Then too, whenever a recipe is labeled "easy" I perk up my ears and listen, copy it, and try it. Here's one such casserole.

EASY SEAFOOD CASSEROLE
12 slices bread, quartered
3 cups tuna, crab, or shrimp
1 green pepper, chopped
1/2 cup celery, chopped
1/2 cup mayonnaise
4 eggs, beaten
3 cups milk
2 cans mushroom soup
1 cup grated cheese

Place 1/2 of the bread in a 9"x13" baking dish. Combine meat, green pepper, onion, celery, and mayonnaise. Spread over bread. Cover with remaining bread. Mix eggs and milk, pour over all and refrigerate over night. Bake 15 minutes at 325 degrees. Spread 2 cans of mushroom soup and cheese over the top and continue baking for 1 hour.

I'm writing this while visiting in California (no comment on the weather) and mentioned to my daughter-in-law that I was

using a seafood title. She told me about a clam chowder which was delicious and here it is.

PACIFIC COAST CLAM CHOWDER
1/2 cup diced bacon
1 small onion, minced
1 cup boiling water
2 cups diced potatoes, pared
3 cups milk
1/2 cup canned cream style corn
1 cup minced clam with liquid
1/2 tsp salt
1/4 tsp pepper
1/4 tsp celery salt
pinch of thyme

In large saucepan, lightly brown bacon. Add onion and cook until tender. Add water and potatoes. Cook covered about 10 minutes until potatoes are tender. Add milk, corn, clams and seasonings. Heat. Serves 6.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election has been called to be held in the Treasure Valley Community College District on Tuesday, February 29, 1972, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the Treasure Valley Community College District for their approval or rejection a proposed tax levy for the fiscal year 1972-73 in the total amount of \$621,972 to finance, in part, the operating budget previously approved by the Budget Committee of the District.

The ballot to be submitted to the voters is as follows:
"TAX LEVY MEASURE SUBMITTED BY
TREASURE VALLEY COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT

The Treasure Valley Community College District has no tax base, thus requiring voter approval for a tax levy necessary to finance, in part, the operating budget of the district. The district's budget committee approved an operating budget which provides for no increase of the 1971-72 operating budget. That portion of the proposed operating budget to be financed by the levy of local taxes for the tax year 1972-73 is \$621,972 which if approved will be \$108,511 greater than that portion of the operating budget financed by local taxes for the previous year.

The Board has calculated that the tax rate per \$1,000 of true cash value, if the levy is approved, shall be \$2.38.

Registered voters resident within the District 30 days prior to the election shall be entitled to vote. The voters shall place a cross (X) or a check mark (✓) in the box () beside "YES", I vote for the tax levy", or in the box () beside "NO, I vote against the tax levy", whichever shall indicate his choice.

Polling places will be opened at the hour of 8:00 a.m., on Tuesday, February 29, 1972, and will remain open until the hours of 8:00 p.m., local time on that date when the polls will be closed and the vote canvassed.

The Ore-Ida Judo Club won the trophy for the largest number of points in the tournament.

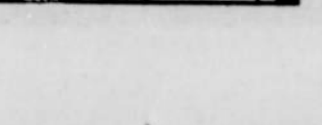

Big Game Stress Noted on Winter Ranges

Big game herds in the eastern half of the state are having a rough time of it this winter with losses noted in some areas from malnutrition as well as predation.

This is the report from district biologists in areas of the Ochoco and through much of Umatilla, Wallawa, Union, and Baker wildlife districts. Stress is also noted in some herds in the John Day and Malheur areas. Moderately severe stress on big game is reported on most other eastern Oregon ranges.

Cold and snow continue to hamper deer through much of the Ochoco Mountains. Although losses are reported moderate up to the present, many animals are taking on a ragged appearance, the first sign of winter fatigue. Predation on deer is also reported to be widespread. Conditions are fairly harsh through the Deschutes country but losses in this district have been mostly from highway kills. Stress is also moderate through Klamath area.

Although snow cover has been light and weather not overly severe, deer losses through the Heppner district are fairly severe. Most losses to date are thought to be the result of coyote predation. At least three coyote losses are reported by biologists and several landowners also report coyote predation.

Fawn deer through much of the Umatilla district show considerable stress. Some losses have occurred on the John Day North Fork. Cold temperatures prevail. Feeding is being carried out in the Meacham Canyon where elk are trapped in deep snow and have concentrated along the Union Pacific railroad. Up to the present, 26 elk and 8 deer have been killed on the railroad and numerous other animals crippled.

Some losses of deer are also reported in the Ritter area of Grant County.

Artificial feeding by Game Commission personnel as well as sportsmen's groups and individuals is widespread in Baker and Union wildlife districts. Deer are under heavy stress in both areas, with fawns showing poor condition. Losses are reportedly due to malnutrition, road kills, crippling, and predation. Animals are wintering in 12 to 40 inches of snow and have concentrated at low elevations along highways and valley floors.

Feeding with alfalfa and pellets is taking place at Ladd Marsh, Medical Springs, Halfway, Richland, Keating, Baker Valley, and other areas where the animals can be reached. Biologists are sure that many animals are trapped back in the mountains by deep snow.

Considerable stress is noted in Wallawa County and feeding is being carried out at Troy, Sled Springs, Wallawa Lake, and the Wallawa River canyon. Unless the weather moderates, biologists feel deer losses in Wallawa County could again be severe.

In Malheur County most losses noted have been in Brogan Canyon. Deer herds are wintering mostly on bare ground through the rest of the district. Coyote predation is quite high on the Brogan Canyon herd. Losses elsewhere in the Malheur district are thought to be mostly from predation as checks on bone marrow on dead animals reveal no undue stress from malnutrition.

In Harney County some losses are reported in the Drewsey and Alvord deer herds. Some stress is also noted in the Goose Lake and Crooked Creek deer herds in Lake County. Feed is being hauled to the trouble spots.

District Championship Taken By Crook County

Crook County High School of Prineville overpowered the rest of the field in the Greater Oregon League District Tournament held at Nyssa last weekend. Scoring 210.5 points, they were far ahead of second place Burns with 111. Nyssa was next with 98.5 points, Vale had 63.5 and Madras, Grant Union and Wadonka followed in that order.

Nyssa will send three wrestlers to the state tournament at Corvallis this weekend as Scott Kido and Phil Wilman took first places in their weights, and Manuel Perez added a second place finish.

Crook County has long been a power in Oregon high school wrestling circles in AAA competition, and this is the first year that they are competing in the Greater Oregon AA district. Their wrestlers hold many state championships.
