

FFA'ers Earn Degrees

Bob and Bill Holmes and Paul Skeen will receive their state farmer degree at the state convention in Pendleton March 21-24.

Over 4,600 students are enrolled in Vocational Agriculture. Only two per cent of the members ever receive the state farmer degree.

The main qualifications are: a student must have completed two years of Vo-Ag; he must be able to lead a group discussion for 45 minutes; he must have completed an outstanding

supervised farming or occupational experience program in which they have earned \$500 or have it invested in a project; and the students must have good leadership and cooperation in the school and community.

All candidates are screened by the state officers who interview them on their farm. Applicants undergo a formal interview and a written test on their knowledge of farming and on the FFA. Their record books and applications are also scored.
