Granny's RULES OF CONDUCT

Taken from Grandma Burgers Cook Book, published in the year 1800 and submitted by Mrs. Dale Witt.

THE HUSBANDS DUTY

A very grave responsibility has the man assumed in his marriage. Doting parents have confided to his care the welfare of their loved daughter, and a trusting woman has risked all her future happiness in his keeping. Largely will it depend upon him whether her pathway shall be strewn with thorns or roses.

Let your wife understand fully your business. In nearly every case she will be found a most valuable adviser when she understands all the circumstances.

Do not be dictatorial in the family circle. The home is the wife's province. It is her natural field of labor, and she should govern and direct its interior management. You would not expect her to come to your office, store or farm and give orders, neither should you interfere with the duties which belong to her.

If a dispute arises, dismiss the subject with a kind word, and do not seek to carry your point by discussion. It is a glorious achievement to master one's own temper. You may discover you are in error, and if your wife is wrong, she will gladly, in her cooler moments acknowledge the fault.

Having confided to your wife all your business affairs, determine with her what your income will be in the coming year. What your household expenses will necessarily be, and then set aside a weekly sum, which should be paid the wife at a stated time. Let the sum be even more than enough, so the wife can pay all bills and can accumulate a small fund of her own, so she may have a feeling of independence. You may be sure she will seldom use the money unwisely, if the husband gives her his entire confidence.

There should be a time for labor and a time for recreation. There should be cultivation of the social nature, and there should be attention given to the spiritual. The wife should not lead a life of drudgery. Matters should be so regulated that she may early finish her labors of the day and the good husband will so control his business that he may be able to accompany his wife to places of amusement and entertainment. Thus the intellectual will be provided for, and the social qualities be kept continually exercised.

A 1970 graduate of Adrian Union High School, he joined the Marine Corps in March, 1970.

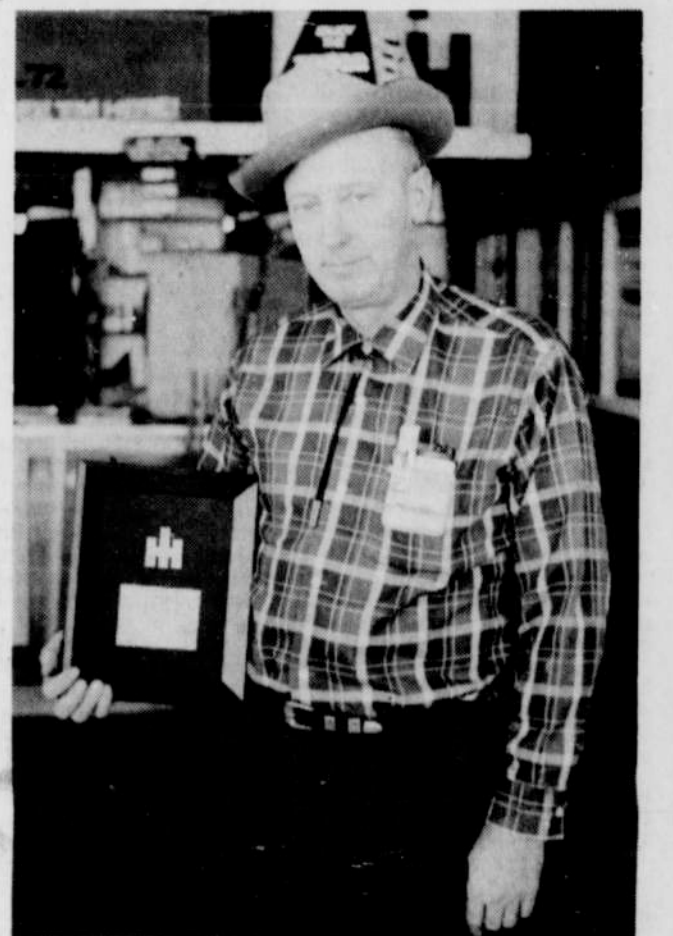
Packwood To Sponsor Bill

Senator Bob Packwood (R-Ore.) says he will co-sponsor legislation which would expel members of Congress whose voting attendance records fall below 60 percent.

The legislation, proposed as a Constitutional Amendment, was introduced by Sen. Margaret Chase Smith (R-Maine). To become law, the bill must be approved by at least two-thirds of each House of Congress and then ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the 50 states within seven years.

Mrs. Smith told Packwood her proposal had received "more popular support from the public than any other proposal that has been submitted to the Senate during my years in the Senate."

Packwood's voting attendance record is approximately 84 percent for his three years in the Senate. The bill has 10 other co-sponsors, in addition to the Oregon senator.

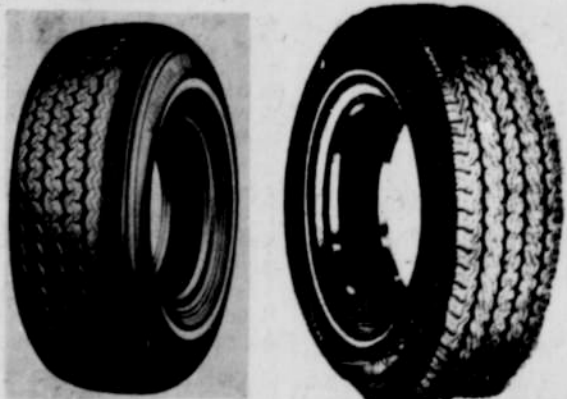

Favorite Foods

Have you always wanted to make a German Chocolate Cake but hated to start from "scratch"? Well, here's a shortcut and I'll defy the "best cook" to tell the difference except of course, for the time it takes to mix it!

SHORT-CUT GERMAN CHOCOLATE CAKE

Cake:
1 pkg. yellow cake mix
1 pkg. Instant Chocolate Pudding mix
2 eggs
2 cups milk
Frosting:
1 cup evaporated milk
4 tbsp. flour
1 cup sugar
3 tbsp. butter
1 cup coconut
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1 tsp. vanilla

Place cake ingredients in the large bowl of your electric mixer and beat on medium speed for 4 minutes. Pour into two 9" greased cake pans and bake 25 to 30 minutes at 350 degrees or till done. While cake is baking, mix first 4 ingredients of frosting and cook on MEDIUM heat, stirring constantly until mixture thickens slightly. Add coconut, nuts, and vanilla and frost cake.



"Soupy Coleslaw" is not our favorite food. I found a way to overcome this by adding a bit of gelatin to the mixture. Then, combined with the vinegar and oil dressing it makes a salad worth remembering. To make it easy, I grind the vegetables in our blender. You can keep it several days in your refrigerator. It's still crisp and fresh. "The gelatin in the secret ingredient."

REFRIGERATOR COLESLAW
4 cups cabbage, shredded
1 cup carrots, diced
1/2 cup green pepper, diced
1/4 cup onion, grated
1/2 cup celery, diced
1/2 cup cold water
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/3 cup sugar
1/3 cup vinegar
1 teaspoon celery seed
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon black pepper
1/3 cup salad oil

Mix vegetables, sprinkle with 1/4 cup water and chill. Dissolve gelatin in 1/4 cup water. In a saucepan mix sugar, vinegar, celery seed, salt, pepper and oil and heat. Add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool syrup and pour over cabbage mixture. This slaw may be stored in refrigerator for several days.
