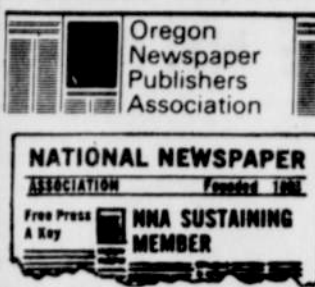

Communist Party Helps Angela

Dr. William K. Lambie, Jr., administrative director of the American Security Council, discussed in a recent press release the Communist Party program to raise funds for Angela Davis, a self-professed Communist Party member who is under indictment and in prison awaiting trial on charges that she was part of a plot to free several prison inmates in California.

The escape attempt resulted in the murder of a judge and the slaying of several of the prisoners. Dr. Lambie said the Angela Davis Defense Fund is one of the most successful fund-raising efforts the Communist Party has ever had, raising more than \$500,000. He predicted that the Communists will start another fund drive if bail is ever set for Miss Davis. And, he said, the money will find its way into the Communist Party treasury.

It will be interesting to see, now that Angela Davis is out on bail, if Dr. Lambie's predictions come true. Many well-meaning people have been suckered into contributing to her fund, mostly through their churches.

The traditional American guarantee of a free trial, and the almost exaggerated attempts to be fair are one thing. It's another thing to watch, and to even help, a person such as Miss Davis. If she is given her freedom after a fair trial, she and her party will continue to try and destroy the American system. And some of our supposedly best meaning people will help her. It doesn't make much sense.

Jehovah's Told Man's Chief Concern Is Survival

Nations of today are on a "collision course" with God, Jehovah's Witnesses were told Sunday at a circuit convention held in Boise according to Charles Dodge, local presiding minister.

More than 1,800 were on hand for the three-day Bible-training convention for Oregon Circuit #5, which is made up of 20 Idaho and Oregon groups.

Referring to survival as "man's chief concern" in this generation, district supervisor W.H. Green said a divinely directed collision will benefit God-fearing men.

"It will forever end the ruining of the earth, pollution of the air, water and food," Green asserted. "Many Bible examples have illustrated God's viewpoint of human affairs and administrations--also His expressed judgement of such. He has never tolerated--indefinitely--false worship or apostasy."

Referring to Ezekiel's prophecy in relation to his theme, "Are You 'Marked' For Survival?", Green said, "This prophecy illustrates how one becomes marked for survival in God's eyes. The 'mark' is not mere Bible knowledge. It is evidenced in an expressed Christian personality. It is seen in one's everyday life--how a man treats his wife, his children and his neighbors; the wife's Christian beauty of subjection, the Christian children's conduct at school. Those who are marked are sharing in helping others to become marked for survival."
