

OUT OF THE PAST

10 YEARS AGO

Nyssa chamber of Commerce members have been told during the past two meetings of the need to secure industry in the area to offset the decrease in migrant laborers coming into Eastern Oregon.

Last week Leonard Hewett, local banker, told of attending a meeting of Idaho-Eastern Oregon Industrial committee where the primary topic was finances. He said the Secretary Howard Bessire should be kept on the road almost continually in an effort to bring industry into the area and not have to spend his time asking for finances from the towns of Treasure Valley.

"He noted the empty buildings in Nyssa and said there was a good possibility of there being more in the not-so-distant future unless industry coming into the area provided workers to replace those lost through mechanized farming."

"Henry Zobell, local sugar factory manager, traced the changes that have taken place in the beet growing industry with each calling for fewer farm laborers."

About 1200 migrant laborers will be brought in the latter part of April by Amalgamated. Chamber President Renstrom noted that fewer laborers were being used in the potato and onion fields, due to special machinery that is now in use.

20 YEARS AGO

The Nyssa City Council has decided to give city residents and farmers an opportunity to take a "straw vote" on the proposed installation of parking meters on Main Street between First and Third Streets.

The vote will be taken through the co-operation of the Gate City Journal. Persons desiring to vote on the question may cast their ballots by marking the ballot printed in this issue, take it to the Journal office and register as they do in any other election. The registration, which will not reveal the way a person votes, will help city officials to determine accurately the results of the election.

The City Council is sponsoring the vote to get an expression from the general public on the controversial issue.

Ralph Coleman, Oregon State College baseball coach, trimmed his 1952 squad to 34 men this week and the survivors included two Nyssa youths, Jack Bowen and Dick Wilson.

30 YEARS AGO

Increased sugar beet yields and greatly reduced hand labor is promised by a recent development that will be tried out this season on an experimental basis in the Nyssa-Nampa district, according to R.G. Larson, district manager of the Amalgamated Sugar Company.

The new innovation will make possible the planting of a single germ beet seed ball--the first essential to a fully mechanized program of sugar beet production. Under the direction of the Amalgamated Sugar Company, test plots will be planted with these segmented beet seeds

in widely scattered areas. A minimum of 400 acres will be tried out the first year. At least 175 acres of this total will be planted in the Nyssa-Nampa district.

A member of the Nyssa Police Force for the last 15 years passed away Sunday at the home of his chief, A.V. Cook.

King, a German Shepherd (police dog) was born 22 years ago and soon became associated with Chief of Police Cook in the suppression of crime in Nyssa. Like a good police officer, King paid attention to his own business, but was friendly and courteous.

The Eagles Lodge of Nyssa recently purchased \$500 worth of United States defense bonds from the First National Bank of Portland, Nyssa branch. The transaction marked the largest single purchase of defense bonds by any organization here.
