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## Good Luck, Bulldogs.

The unbelievable record of Nyssa's athletic teams continues, culminating Monday night with a victory over Madras which gave Nyssa a spot in the state tournament at Eugene for the second year.

The Bulldogs had previously clinched the SRV League championship, and the victory over Vale Friday night before perhaps the largest basketball crowd in the history of Nyssa High School gave them an unbeaten season in SRV play with 12 wins and no defeats. This remarkable record has been overshadowed by the down-to-the-wire efforts for the tournament berth.

The game with Madras Monday evening was an almost identical repeat of last year's game, when the two teams played in John Day on March 13 for the No. 2 spot in the state tournament, and both times Nyssa was the victor. Large crowds from both Nyssa and Madras testified to the interest that fans have in their high school athletic contests.

The exciting win over Madras was a fitting climax to a highly successful season for the Nyssa Bulldogs. 19 wins against only 4 defeats is a record that may take years to match again, and is certainly a record that Nyssa fans can relish, and which the players can cherish forever.

An almost amusing sidelight to this most successful season is the fact that we fans don't change very much, win or lose. We have heard rumblings that "if only the coach had done this or that we would have won this or that ballgame", or "if this ballplayer had replaced that ballplayer we would have won more games." Perhaps this is only indicative of high interest on the part of Nyssa fans, but it's pretty hard to knock success. It's kind of like Jack Nicklaus remarking after a 66 round of golf that if he had only sunk 4 more putts he would have had a 62. We lost four games this year by a total of 11 points, so any combination of a basket or two a game and we might have wound up undefeated. On the other hand, just one or two fewer baskets in several games could have given us about a 13-10 season. The important thing is that our coaches and players performed magnificently, and we'll settle for any number of 19-4 seasons in the future.

Now they go to the state tournament. Only the best reach this stage of a basketball season, and any one of the 16 teams is capable of going all the way to the championship. The team that keeps its desire, has the most poise, has a little luck and plays the best for four days will be the champ. That team very well could be the Nyssa Bulldogs.

We can only say, "do your best, fellows, and be assured that Nyssa fans are behind you all the way".

## Malheur IED Sponsors Remedial Speech Clinics

The Malheur County Intermediate Education District will be sponsoring again this year a series of speech and hearing clinics for five year olds who plan to attend school this coming school term. Parents who have reason to believe that their child may have either a speech or hearing problem are encouraged to have their child evaluated at one of the clinics. In many cases, parents if instructed properly, are able to assist their children prior to school opening and also be made aware of the scheduling procedures and services of Malheur County IED hearing and speech therapy program should they wish to take advantage of them. each evaluation requires approximately twenty minutes.
