Following the luncheon, Yens Brun Pedersen of Norway showed slides of his country and gave a talk on the industry, people and their customs. Yens Brun came to this country as an AFS (American Field Service) student, is attending Parma High School and his American family is the Rev. and Mrs. Wayne Wardwell of Parma.

Yens said that he had heard in Norway that all the girls in the United States wore glasses and were fat but has found this to be untrue.

He told many interesting things about his country. Norway is a Monarchy, they have a cabinet, a prime minister and a house of representatives and their government is built on the English and French Constitutions. There are seven political parties, an election is held every four years. The Labor Party is now the majority party. They have good relations with other countries and belong to the United Nations.

Schools in Norway are different, the work is harder. Sports are not a part of the school activities but they do have soccer, handball, skiing and other sports but no football. There are 700 students enrolled in the school that Yens attended. There are no bussing problems as each student gets to school on his own and takes a lunch. Norway has four million people, 97% of which are Lutherans. Their main industry is lumber and electricity is furnished by rivers and waterfalls. The roads are narrow and steep, so small cars mostly imported from Japan and Germany are used.

Independence Day or National Day in Norway is May 17, these are celebrated with parades and bands playing in the streets. Norway is a beautiful country of mountains, forests and rivers. Many people live along the shores around the lakes and in the valleys.

They have a social Democratic Society. Television and many other things are controlled by the government. They have free medical care and in some cases free medicine.

The meeting was adjourned after a short business meeting.
