

Orange and Green Decorates Phifer-Freitag Ceremonies

Favorite Foods

I dug through my files until I found this Salmon Loaf—because—this being "fish time" I was sure you'd like it. I had friends over for dinner the other evening and they declared it to be "tops" and they weren't being polite!

ZIPPY SALMON LOAF

1 #2 can red salmon, flaked
2 cups boiling milk
3/4 cup crackers (crushed)
1 tsp. instantized flour
4 tsp. butter
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. M.S.G.
2 eggs, beaten
1 onion, chopped
1 tsp. lemon juice
Flake salmon, mix with crumbs and juice. Make a white sauce with the milk, flour, butter, salt, pepper and M.S.G. Add to onion and lemon juice. Pour into a 1 1/2 qt. casserole and bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Serves 6.

Combinations aren't successful and many husbands won't try them. Cooks refer to them as goulash or left overs. If you have these 4 things in your refrigerator or emergency shelf you can make a delightful dish.

VEGETABLE MEDLEY

2 slices bacon, cut fine
1 onion, diced
1 #2 can tomatoes
1 #2 can green beans
Brown the bacon, add onion and cook until clear. Add tomatoes and beans and cook 15 minutes. Serves 6.
