All the visiting students will also participate in Nyssa's AFS Night "Un Incontro Con L'Italia" scheduled for March 16.

Eddy Lukmen, AFS student from Indonesia, is currently staying at 4216 Teton Street, Boise, Idaho. Indonesia is a nation of islands in Southeast Asia which has more than 13,000 islands, of which 6,000 are inhabited by 120 million people.

Eddy stated that the students in the United States don't study as hard as those in Thailand. In Thailand they take 22 different subjects, have more school days and more hours. He also said that the students have more respect for the teachers in Thailand than they do in the States.

The Ore-Ida Club No. One Junior team took second place behind Twin Falls in the team event. 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Some comments on the students and teachers in the U. S. and how they differ from those in her country were: (1) Students aren't forced to work hard and can choose whether they want to learn a lot or just a little. (2) Teachers are more buddy-buddy with the students than the teachers of Germany. (3) The school system is different in Germany because the students can't choose their subjects, they have school only in the mornings but on Saturdays too. (4) Reports on progress come only twice a year. (5) Approximately 14 subjects are required and the schedule is different each day.

There are 27 selected students preparing for the trip and also six chaperones: Mr. and Mrs. Gary Vernon Thompson, Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Lords, Miss Mary Omborg, and Mrs. Robert Haney.
