#### CONSUMER OR WORKER PROTECTION?

A new star has risen over Washington, D.C., called "Consumer Protection" and most politicians seem to have hitched their handwagons to it.

The idea is to create a new government bureau to be called a Consumer Protection Agency. One of its chief duties would be to publicize and promote legal action with regard to all the faults in products and services committed by companies, including management and all of the persons employed in the plants, stores and other workshops of the nation.

For example, the new agency would receive all customer complaints and put them on public display. It would be empowered to demand private company data and the files of other federal agencies to obtain complaints for public display. Reports would be written, press releases issued, federal actions started, private lawsuits encouraged—all to get nationwide publicity critical of companies, their products, and their operations.

What could companies look forward to? Lost confidence, lost customers, lost sales, and lost respect in their communities and industries. Also, there would be lost products, lost production time, and lost money, time and talent fighting public and legal battles.

What could consumers look forward to? Higher prices and taxes. What can employees look forward to? Lost jobs. "Consumerism" as a voluntary, do-your-own-thing movement may be keeping those who provide goods and services on their toes. But, putting consumer advocates on the federal payroll with power to condemn products, ruin sales, raise prices and kill jobs is "protection" we can do without.

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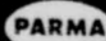
