WHEN IS A BARGAIN A bargain? Is a bargain a thrill, like finding money? Is it proof of your ability as a shopper? No--a bargain is only a bargain when you need it, it is what you want, and you pay a less-than-average price for it. Check these points before you buy that bargain: Why is the store selling it for less? How much will you save? Ten per cent off a small purchase is not enough to buy it unless you would buy it anyway at the full price. But ten per cent off a major purchase may save you enough to make the sale a real bargain.

YOUR BASIC RIGHT. The Fair Credit Reporting Act of 1971 insures protection of some basic rights. The main purpose of the law is to protect the consumer against the circulation of erroneous, incomplete or obsolete information which firms use in deciding whether or not to give you credit.

The law gives you the following right: the right to know the nature and substance of all information in your file at the consumer credit reporting agency, the right to know the sources of this information, and the right to know who has received a consumer credit report on you within the preceding six months. You are also given the right to challenge the information if it is incorrect or incomplete.
