Fair Board Makes Plans For Season, Adopts Budget

The Malheur County Fair Board met with a full agenda at their regular meeting in March. Held in the Meeting Room of the Malheur County Library, they listened to representatives of the Snake River Valley Horse Racing Association who requested cooperation from the Board in putting on the annual horse races. These races have been scheduled for May 11, 12, and 13, and 17, 18 and 19 and the racing association stated these dates would not conflict with racing in Boise. They stated that over the past two years the association has suffered considerable financial loss. The Fair Board agreed to cooperate with the Association as this is an event which creates considerable interest in the area.

The budget for the annual 4-H Spring Show in June was discussed with the Board allocating \$1,000.00 for this event. Over the years this event has been backed by the Fair Board. The Spring Show under the leadership of Mrs. Helen Conner, County Extension Agent, is for all 4-H participants in the Home Economics Divisions.

The fiscal budget for 72-73 was determined by the Board and presented to the Court in the amount of \$55,700.00. Revenue for this budget comes solely from racing funds, rentals of facilities, and admissions to the fair. No tax funds are received by the Board in administering the grounds for year-round use and for the annual county fair as well as several allied events such as the 4-H Spring Show.

Gordon Capps, Chairman of the Board, stated that improvements are being planned for the Main Exhibit Hall as the money becomes available. This facility is used primarily by a number of non-paying organizations such as the Boy Scouts, 4-H Rifle Club and float building. Heating of this facility has been a problem and this has top priority in planning by the Board.

Also under consideration are a number of suggestions made by the Merit Funding Judge. It is felt that improvement in the area of lighting, increased wash rack areas, some general landscaping, and increased exhibit space would add to the possibility of a higher rating at the next fair.

General planning for the 1972 Annual Malheur County Fair which is scheduled for August 16 through the 19 was discussed with entertainment being planned for all four nights. While no definite commitments have been made by the Board, Capps stated that a diversified program is being planned that should appeal to all. Admission will be charged again this year and will be the same as last year—\$1.00 for each person, age six and older for the entire four day fair. This admission button will entitle the wearer to attend all the entertainment and view all exhibits throughout the fair.

Other decisions made concerning the Fair are the official release time for all exhibits which will be 7:30 p.m. on the 19th. The Fair will officially open at 10:00 a.m. on Wednesday, the 16th.

Capps said the Board is hopeful that everyone in the County will become involved in the Fair by exhibiting, assisting at the Fair, and attending.

Spring Handicap Golf Tournament Scheduled

Following are the adopted rules for the tourney.

1. No entry fee.
2. Single elimination.
3. Arranging the match is dependent on the players.
4. Failure to arrange a time for the match will cause both players to forfeit. If a match cannot be arranged, the pro should be contacted.
5. A match may be settled in any manner mutually agreeable to the players, except for the semi-final and final matches. These must be bona fide 18-hole rounds of golf.
6. The winner's name shall be inscribed on the revolving trophy.
7. New members who wish to play will be added through the third round.
8. Deadline for the first match is Sunday, March 26. Final match play, May 7.
9. Full handicap.

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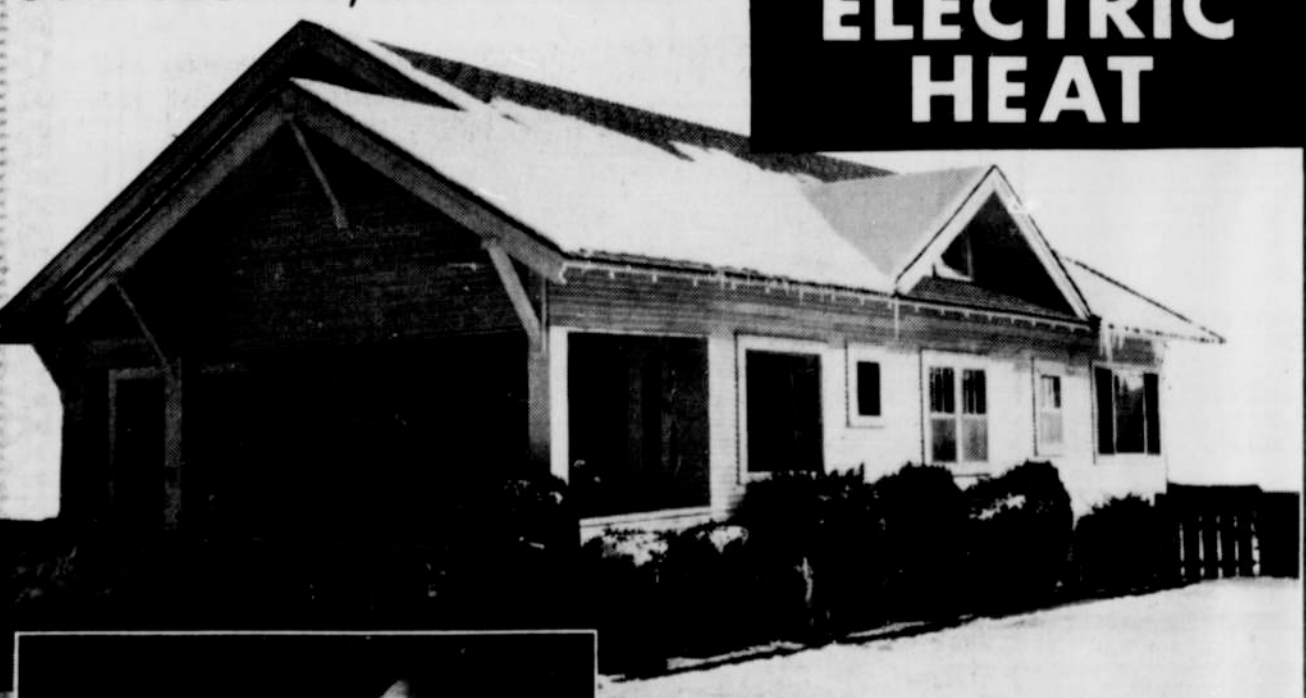
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
