## MILITARY POLICE SOUGHT BY ARMY

The Department of the Army has announced the availability of a "Military Police Enlistment" option for young interested in crime prevention, investigation, and law enforcement.

According to SGT Mathews, local Army recruiter, enlistees in the new "Military Police Enlistment" option are guaranteed their choice of assignment to one of six units in the United States after completing four months of basic and specialized training.

SGT Mathews stated: "In addition, enlistees are guaranteed at 16 months with the unit they choose. Units included under this option are based in California, North Carolina, Kansas, Texas, Maryland, and New Jersey.

Farmers, ranchers and their workers were reminded of a basic rule for safe sprinkler-pipe handling by Idaho Power Company Wednesday as the start of 1972's irrigation season neared. The rule:

"Don't up-end pipe--power lines may be overhead." A. G. Blair, the utility's safety director, said the rule is printed in both English and Spanish on adhesive-backed signs Idaho Power employees are placing at pump installations and other conspicuous locations.

He suggested that customers assist in the accident-prevention program, noting that the signs are available from local Idaho Power offices at no charge.

"One of the surest and safest ways to avoid accidents is to store irrigation pipe as far away from overhead power lines as possible," he emphasized.

Well drillers, contractors and customers using such equipment as portable loaders, hay

stackers and metal ladders also were urged by the safety director to practice caution when working near power lines.

"The lines are safe until someone becomes careless," Blair declared.

## Favorite Foods

It's about time we talked about cookies since they're an American favorite. The first I'll mention is a moist cookie which can be cut into bars and spread with a yummy icing. Raisins are the secret ingredient which causes them to be moist.

## MOIST RAISIN BARS

1 cup seedless raisins  
2 cups water  
1 cup sugar  
1 cube butter  
1 egg, beaten  
2 1/2 cups flour  
1 tsp soda  
1 tsp cinnamon  
1 tsp nutmeg  
1/4 tsp cloves  
Cook raisins in water until 1 cup water remains, cream sugar and butter and stir in egg, add raisins and 1 cup of the water. Stir in the dry ingredients which have been sifted together. Mix well and spread on a greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees 20 to 25 minutes.

## ICING

1 cube butter  
1 cup brown sugar  
1/4 cup milk  
Cook in saucepan for 3 minutes. Cool slightly and add

enough powdered sugar to spread easily on Raisin Bars.

The Magic Cookie Bar is very easy to make. All the recipes I choose are easy because that's the way I cook. Your cookie eaters will be back for seconds when you make these so if you want to save some for later you'll have to hide them.

## MAGIC COOKIE BAR

Just layer ingredients in pan:  
1/4 cup butter or margarine  
1 cup graham cracker crumbs  
1 cup shredded coconut  
1 6-oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate pieces  
1 6-oz. pkg. butterscotch pieces  
1 15-oz. can sweetened condensed milk (do not substitute)  
1 cup chopped nuts

Melt butter in 13"x9"x2" baking dish. Sprinkle crumbs over butter (tap sides of pan to distribute crumbs). Sprinkle on coconut, chocolate pieces and butterscotch pieces. Pour sweetened condensed milk over top. Sprinkle on nuts and press lightly into pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) for 30 min. Cool in pan. Cut into 40 (1"x2") bars.

## Oregon Veteran Loans Top Billion Dollar Mark

The billion-dollar mark has been exceeded in loans to Oregon veterans for the acquisition of homes and farms, H.C. Saalfeld, director of the State Department of Veterans' Affairs, reported today.

The loan that put the program into the billion-dollar circle was granted to Loony Ray Engel for the purchase of a new three-bedroom home in Southwest Portland, Saalfeld said. Engel, a carpenter foreman for a home building company in Portland, served four years in the Air Force from 1966 to 1970 and came out a sergeant. He is married and has two children.

Saalfeld said that in the early days of the veterans' loan program starting in 1945, when the maximum loan was \$3,000 for both homes and farms, it took two years for the veterans' department to lend its first \$1 million.

Today, with the top home loan at \$24,500 and the farm loan \$80,000, he said the department is lending \$1 million every two working days. As an indication of the rate of growth,

the first half-billion dollars were loaned by November, 1966, or 21 years after the start of the program. The second half-billion dollars were loaned in just the last five years.

Saalfeld said over 74,000 veterans have now used the loan and another 175,000 are still entitled, with more coming on as Vietnam veterans are discharged. Over half the applications now come from post-Korean veterans, the remainder being nearly evenly divided between World War II and Korean War veterans.

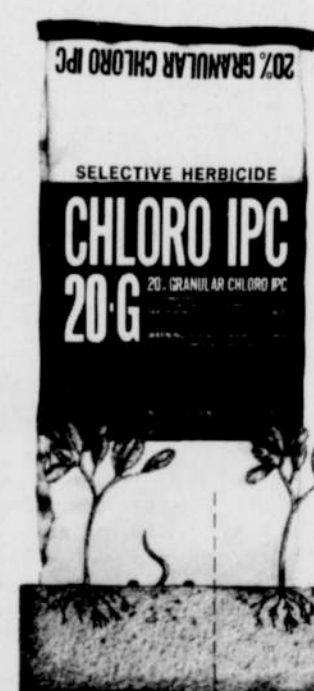
Of the \$1 billion borrowed, veterans have paid off nearly \$452 million in principal and \$175 million in interest.
