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NYSSA BOYS FIND BODY OF JORDON VALLEY MAN MISSING SINCE FEB. 6

A body, identified as that of Bruce Allen Terry, 20, young Jordan Valley man missing since his car plunged into the Snake River Feb. 6, was found in the Snake River about six miles above Nyssa Sunday evening.

The report was first made to Oregon State Police by two Nyssa boys, Bob Stout and Mark Apple, who were fishing in the Snake and discovered the body on the bank of the river. The Malheur County Sheriff's office was notified about 7 p.m. Sunday.

Owyhee County sheriff's officers reported that the tentative identification was made from a western leather belt which bore the name "Bruce". No other identification such as a wallet was found on the body.

Malheur County Deputy Ron Mallae and state police officers recovered the body which was then turned over to Idaho authorities as it was recovered from Gold Island on the Idaho side of the river.

The body was taken to the Dakan Chapel in Caldwell.

Sheriff Asks Campers To Tell of Travel Plans

Sportsmen, rockhounds, campers, and others who go into remote areas for weekend jaunts should let family members of the Sheriff's Department know where they are going and when they expect to be back, Malheur County Sheriff Robert Ingram said Tuesday.

In the spring, the sheriff said, there is usually a rash of "missing persons." They have taken off for the outback, and then gotten stuck, had their vehicle break down or had some other sort of accident.

If the sheriff's department knows approximately where a group had planned to go and what time they planned to be back, search and rescue operations, if necessary, can be carried out with minimum delay.

Young Terry and a friend, Keith Carson, had attended a dance in Murphy, Idaho, and were returning home to Jordan Valley when Terry's car apparently missed a turn on the ice-covered roadway and plunged into the Snake River.

Carson was able to swim to shore and make his way to the ranch home of Elias Jaca where he sounded the alarm and a search for Terry was instigated. Divers and boats dragging the river failed to find the young man.

Terry was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Duard Terry of Jordan Valley, and graveside services were conducted Wednesday at 2 p.m. by the Rev. Fr. A.J. Fisher of St. Bernard's Catholic Church.

ANNUAL CANCER CRUSADE UNDERWAY, VOLUNTEERS WILL CALL THIS MONTH

The Annual Cancer Crusade of the American Cancer Society Oregon Division, started April 3 and will continue through April 15. In addition to seeking funds to finance programs in research, education and service, volunteers will distribute educational materials as well.

The crusade theme this year is: "We want to wipe out cancer in your lifetime."

What are some of the important cancer statistics?

Currently there are about 22,000 cancer deaths annually of patients aged 15 to 44. Cancer is the leading cause of death among women aged 30 to 54. More than half of all cancer deaths last year were among persons over 65.

More men than women died of cancer last year. This has been true since 1949. The ratio in 1972 will be about 55 men to 45 women.

Savings Bonds Sales Increase

MALHEUR LAW AGENCIES CRACK DOWN ON DRUG VIOLATORS, 10 ARRESTED

The combined law enforcement agencies of Malheur County began Tuesday night to execute warrants issued on persons allegedly involved in drug activities.

Arrested were Richard Robles, 23, Ontario, charged with allegedly furnishing heroin; John Luna, 20, Nyssa, allegedly furnishing amphetamines; Ruben Martinez, 23, Ontario, allegedly furnishing marijuana; Robert Estrada, 30, Ontario, allegedly furnishing marijuana.

Also Robert C. Keele, 25, Ontario, allegedly furnishing amphetamines; John Church, 23, Nyssa, allegedly furnishing marijuana; Kenneth Church, 19, allegedly furnishing marijuana; and Jerrold Strickland, 22, Nyssa, allegedly possessing marijuana.

Two juveniles, one from Ontario and one from Nyssa, were arrested on the warrants but will be remanded back to juvenile court.

They were all taken to the county jail in Vale.

The arrests were made in furtherance of Malheur County's law enforcement agencies' aim in pursuing uniform criminal policy and procedures.

Participating were the Ontario Police Department, Nyssa Police Department, Malheur County Sheriff's Office and the Ontario Office of the Oregon State Police.

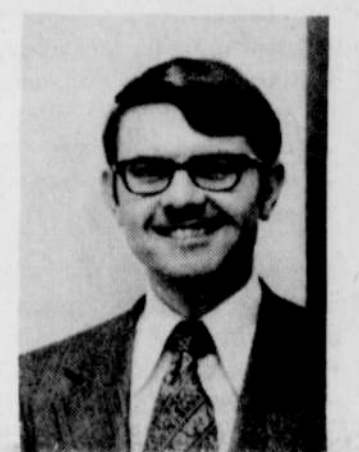
The agencies announced last night the information of the Malheur inter-Agency Narcotics Team, more commonly known as "MINT".

"MINT" was formed in the late months of 1971 and has been a functioning organization meeting weekly since that time.

At 10 p.m. Tuesday, the law enforcement agencies under Chief Jim Jones, Ontario, Chief Alvin Allen, Nyssa, Malheur County Sheriff Bob Ingram and Lt. Russell Haynes, Oregon State Police, began to execute the warrants. Sixteen warrants have been issued by the justice courts of Ontario and Nyssa to be served by the law enforcement agencies.

Judge Jeff D. Dorroh has called a grand jury session for April 10 and 11 for these drug matters as well as others to be presented to the grand jury for its consideration.
