So, get your secret ingredients together and stir up a batch of Cheese Blintzes with Chef Ivan Runge. Makes 6 to 8.

Cheese Blintzes with Sour Cream

(as prepared at Rose's Restaurant in Portland)

CHEESE BLINTZES
3 eggs 1 1/2 cups milk
3/4 cup cake flour 1/2 tsp salt
Butter for frying

CHEESE FILLING
1 lb. cottage cheese 1/2 tsp sugar
2 egg yolks 1 Tablespoon sour cream
1/2 tsp salt 1 Tablespoon flour
1/2 tsp grated Lemon Rind

Beat eggs and add flour and milk alternately to make a thin batter. Add salt. Pour about 3 tablespoons of batter on a well-buttered griddle or frying pan, spreading it as thin as possible. Let fry until brown and turn out on a tea towel, browned side up.

Mix filling ingredients and spread evenly over the surface, tuck in ends and roll up. Brown in butter and serve hot with sour cream and jam on the side. Makes 6 to 8.
