Annual Achievement Day April 10 For AAUW

Jane Wyatt, consumer officer for the Oregon Department of Agriculture, will be in Malheur County Monday, April 10. She will be speaking to the Ontario Branch of the American Association of University Women and will be the featured speaker when the Malheur County Extension Homemakers get together for their annual achievement day. Mrs. Wyatt, who's job is to coordinate the Department of Agriculture's consumer activities and to act as a contact person for the public, was appointed in January 1971. The position was newly created by the legislature. She works without staff. At the same time Mrs. Wyatt was appointed, two women were also appointed to the Oregon State Board of Agriculture representing the consumers. Mrs. Gayle Gilmour, Salem, and Mrs. Clara Peoples, Portland, fill these spots. Mrs. Wyatt reports that after a year on the job she is receiving nearly 100 telephone calls a month from consumers throughout the state. Currently she is working on the standardization of cottage cheese containers and will have

regulations ready for a public hearing soon. Mrs. Wyatt said some processors started using 14 ounce containers for cottage cheese. They appear so near like the standard 16 ounce container the consumer is confused. Under the new regulation only 8 ounce, 16 ounce or multiples of 16 ounce containers could be sold in Oregon. The regulation also seeks to end the use of "pint" and "quart" measures for cottage cheese, requiring designation by actual weight. By the 1973 legislative session Mrs. Wyatt forecasts a bill to require "open dating" of food products in grocery stores and "unit pricing" so consumers can compare one brand against another, will be ready. These changes, as well as a number of others, will be discussed by Mrs. Wyatt when she visits the county. Anyone wishing to hear Mrs. Wyatt is invited to attend either of the two meetings. The Malheur County Homemakers Achievement Day will begin with a 9:30 a.m. coffee at the East Side Cafe in Ontario. Mrs. Barbara Powers Parma homemaker, will talk

about wild flowers of the area in the morning. Mrs. Wyatt will speak at 1:30 p.m., after lunch to be served at the restaurant. Favorite Foods

Ham left over from Easter? I have an excellent recipe, for Ham Loaf. Ham, combined with pork and hamburger have a delightful flavor, especially if its topped with a brown sugar mixture and pineapple slices. When I make this I ask the butcher to grind the meats together. (He's a friendly butcher!) A vegetable tossed salad and baked potatoes finish the main course of this dinner. **UPSIDE-DOWN HAM LOAF**
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 tsp. dry mustard
2 tbsp. vinegar
3 slices pineapple
1/3 lb. ground pork
1 lb. ground ham
2/3 lb. ground hamburger
2 eggs, beaten
1 cup cracker crumbs
1 cup milk
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. salt
Blend sugar, mustard, and vinegar in a 9" x 4" x 3" pan and arrange pineapple slices in syrup. Mix together pork, beef, ham, eggs, crumbs, milk, pepper and salt. Pack on top of syrup and fruit. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 1 hour, 15 minutes. Serves 8. Have you ever added Angel Food Cake to a salad and presto — a dessert. I went to a bridge party the other evening and this orange — angel was served. Its easy on the hostess and pleases the guests. **ORANGE ANGEL DESSERT**
1 Angel Food Cake, broken into bits
1 pkg. whipped topping mix
1 pt. orange sherbet
3/4 cup boiling water
1 3 oz. pkg. orange jello
1 can mandarin orange slices
Dissolve jello in 3/4 cup boiling water. Refrigerate, until slightly thickened. Fold in the softened sherbet and the whipped topping. Pour over the cake and oranges which have been placed in a 9" x 13" x 2" pan. Serves 10.

Social Security Recipients Must Report Incomes

Social Security beneficiaries with 1971 earnings in excess of \$1680.00 must make their annual report by April 17, according to George L. Fleshman, Social Security manager in La Grande. Fleshman explained that the present retirement test requires that 1971 earned income must be reported to Social Security by April 17 if the following is true:
1. Social Security checks were received for any month or months of 1971.
2. Total 1971 earnings were over \$1680.00.
3. The beneficiary was under age 72 any part of 1971. Do not include income from other pensions, rent, interest, dividends, payments received from sale of property or other investment income. "The \$1680 includes only wages, salary, bonuses, etc. earned working for someone else or net earnings from self employment if you are in business for yourself," said Fleshman. Anyone who should report but does not have a report card form can secure one by phoning the La Grande office at 963-4131 or the Ontario office at 889-5005.

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
