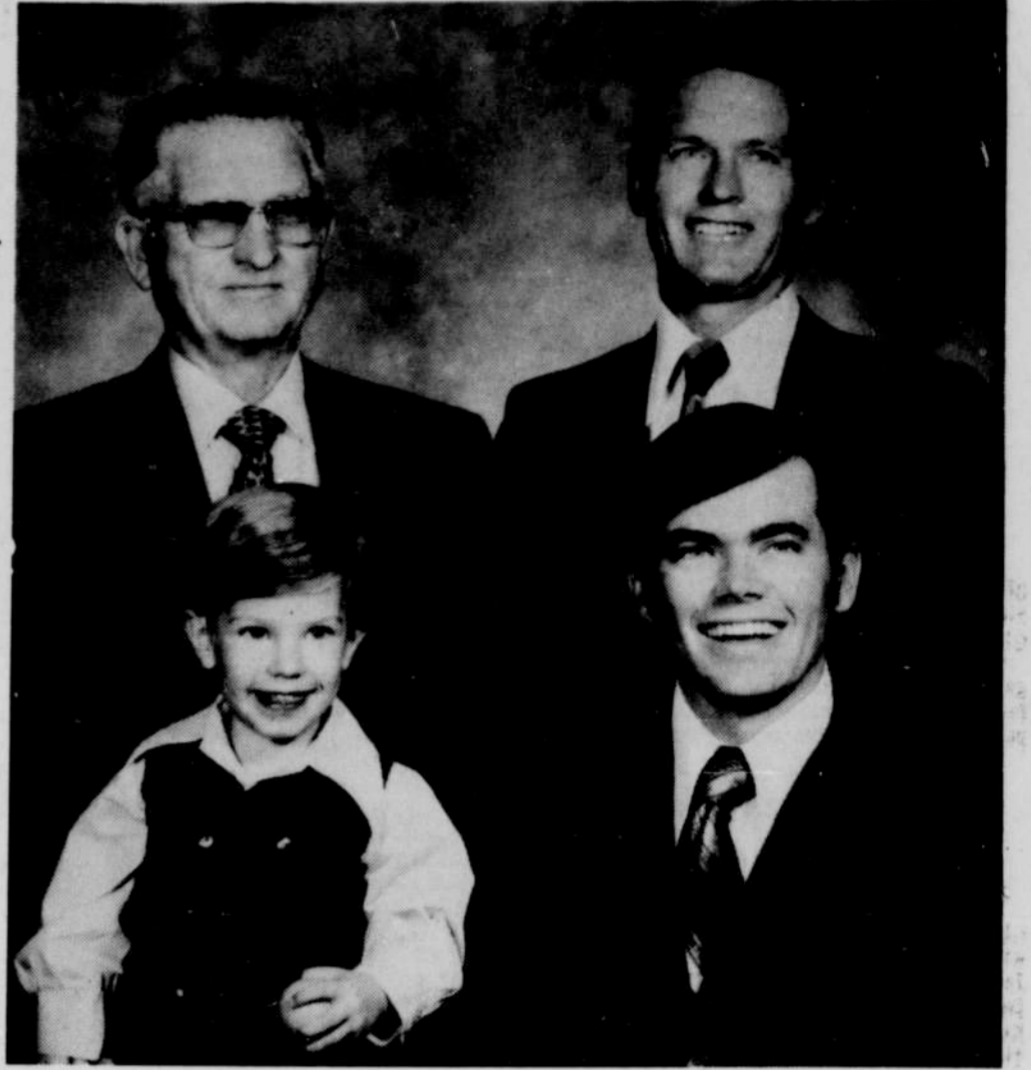
Members voted to donate \$35 for a 4-H Scholarship to summer school at OSU and \$15 for a plaque for the winner of the FFA public speaking contest.

The Occupational Health and Safety Act will be explained in a special program scheduled at 1:30 p.m. in room W-10 of the Treasure Valley Community College Weese Building. The date to remember is May 23.

Harry Hoch, college Director of Continuing Education said representatives of both Oregon State and Federal agencies will discuss the Act and answer questions.

Firefighters Need Physicals

A reminder to all Snake River Valley firefighters concerning physical examinations and identification cards was issued this week by George R. Gurr, manager of the Vale District, Bureau of Land Management.

Gurr said all crewmen must have their physical examinations completed and pictures attached to identification cards before being dispatched to any fire. Appointments for physicals must be made by the

individual firefighter with a doctor of his choice. Identification pictures will be taken at the Vale fire yard and appointments can be made by contacting the fire control office in Vale. Identification cards must also have the owner's social security number. Proof of United States citizenship is also required.

All physical examinations and I. D. cards must be completed by June 15 of this year.
