Young TV Actress To Help Dairy Promotion



ANGELA CARTWRIGHT - Miss Cartwright, 19, joined forces with the Oregon dairy-men when she posed for the kick-off billboard for the new dairy advertising campaign which utilizes foreign languages. It marks the first departure from the standard "Every Body Needs Milk" slogan since the campaign was inaugurated almost four years ago, according to Ray Kozak, executive secretary of the Oregon Dairy Products Commission. Miss Cartwright appears on the billboard as a young French girl, reminding Oregonians "Tout le monde a besoin de lait" - the French translation of the popular "Every Body Needs Milk" slogan. The French billboard is part of a six-board series produced jointly by the Dairy Farmers of Oregon and the Washington Dairy Farmers. The five other billboards depict young people in foreign costume representing West Germany, Norway, Great Britain (Scotland), Russia and the Netherlands. Each billboard has the appropriate foreign version

of the "Every Body Needs Milk" message. More than 350 outdoor boards will carry the new advertising message to consumers in Oregon and Washington. Miss Cartwright is scheduled for promotional appearances in Portland on April 16 and 17, and in Eugene and Salem on April 18. Highlights of Miss Cartwright's career include roles in the movies, "The Sound of Music," "Lad A Dog," "Somebody Up There Likes Me," and "Something of Value." She has also appeared in numerous television specials, and was a regular on the "Lost in Space" television series.

They laughed when I bought my first Bond.

HAMBURGER DELIGHT 1 lb. hamburger 1 pkg. frozen peas 2 cups celery, chopped 1 can cream of mushroom or celery soup 1 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon Accent 1 small onion, chopped fine 6 tablespoons cream or milk 1 small pkg. of potato chips Sauté hamburger and onions until browned slightly, and place in a 2 quart casserole. Cover with a layer of frozen peas and a layer of celery. Mix salt, pepper, accent and cream with soup and spread evenly over hamburger and vegetables. Crush potato chips and cover casserole. Bake at 375 degrees for 30 minutes. Serves 8. GROUND BEEF BUDGET SOUP 1 lb. ground beef 1 tsp. seasoned salt 1/8 tsp. pepper 1/2 cup cracker or bread crumbs 1 egg 1 quart fresh vegetables, pared and sliced (2 potatoes, 1 large onion, 2 carrots 2 stalks celery) 2 tsp. salt 3/4 tsp. monosodium glutamate (Accent) Add seasoned salt, pepper, cracker crumbs and egg to beef and mix thoroughly. Shape into 16 one-inch balls. Drop into 1 quart of boiling water and cook for 30 minutes. Remove fat if desired. Add vegetables, salt and Accent and enough water to cover vegetables. Cook until vegetables are tender and serve. (Two cups uncooked noodles may be added to the beef balls instead of the vegetables).

TAX NEWS

EXEMPTIONS CAN BE CLAIMED FOR ALL YOUR DEPENDENTS

April 17th looms nearer, and taxpayers who have put off preparing their income tax returns will have to come to grips with that Form 1040 they have desperately been avoiding. It's a cinch they'll remember to claim their children as exemptions. But will they remember to claim other eligible dependents? Not always. In their rush to beat the deadline, says H & R Block, America's Largest Tax Service, taxpayers have been known to forget all types of legitimate deductions, including relatives whom they support. If you have certain close relatives living with you or whom you supported for the entire year, and they did not file a joint return with anyone else, you may be able to claim a \$675 dependency exemption. In order to claim this exemption, your dependent may not have earned over \$675 in gross taxable income, and you must have contributed more than half of the total cost of his support. The Internal Revenue Service defines the cost of support to include, among other items, payments for food, clothing, shelter, entertainment, and medical care. Certain types of income received during the year, such as Social Security payments, are not counted as taxable income. However, they still must be considered as being funds available for support, when you are trying to determine whether you contributed more than half of the support. Suppose an uncle lives part of the time with you and part of the time with other relatives. If you and at least one other person contributed major support (each individual contributing 10% or more of the cost of support) join together to file Form 2130 (Multiple Support Statement) then one of you will be able to claim the full \$675 dependency exemption for your uncle. This can only be claimed if no one person contributed 50% or more of the total cost of support and all other conditions are met. If one person contributed more than half of the cost of the uncle's support, then he would be the only one entitled to claim the exemption.
