With the Oregon Shakespearean Festival's third Spring season in its final week, some 45,000 regular patrons will soon receive the Festival's Spring newsletter as part of special pre-sale of tickets for Association members.

The Festival's 32nd summer season of plays will start June 17 with a special discounted preview week of performances in the outdoor Elizabethan stagehouse. The full series will get underway on June 24, following the traditional "Feast of the Tribe of Will" in Ashland's Lithia Park. By the time the 1972 season ends on September 10, a total of 160 performances will have been presented in both the outdoor stagehouse and the air-conditioned indoor Angus Bowmer Theatre.

The special summer ticket presale is open to 1972 Festival Association members through April 30. By purchasing tickets during this period, patrons get a valuable advance "jump" on seating which has traditionally been difficult to obtain later in the year. The general sale of summer season tickets starts on May 1, 1972.

Indian Rock Writings



Michael Kurtz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Kurtz, is pictured with "Indian Rock Writings." In a rugged and remote area of the Owyhee River canyon are found some of the most interesting evidence of man. Man who hunted and lived here many years ago and found safety, food and water years before the first white man came to this continent.

We find much evidence of his presence in the many artifacts to be found and also in the "Indian Rock Writings." These rock writings are of two types, distinguished by the methods they were made. Those painted on the rocks are designated as pictographs and those cut into the surface of the rock are called petroglyphs. The accompanying pictures are petroglyphs taken four years ago. This particular site has 70 to 80 rocks with a great variety of designs and symbols.

We have pictures of some but not all and are planning a "photographic safari" in the near future. An invitation is extended to anyone interested in making this trip to study and photograph these "writings."
