First National Bank of Oregon Distributes Charitable Trust

Eighteen non-profit organizations in Oregon are to benefit from the 12th annual distribution of funds from the J.G. Edwards Charitable Trust administered by First National Bank of Oregon.

Stetson B. Harman, senior vice president and executive trust officer at First National, said the 18 beneficiaries this year will divide \$29,000 from the trust established by J.G. Edwards, Central Oregon sheep

rancher who died in 1945. The largest single gift, a check for \$5,000, will be contributed to the Oregon Independent College Foundation to help support the colleges.

Other recipients, the amounts they will receive and for what uses, include: Albina Child Development Center, \$2,500 to begin a swimming lesson program; Boy Scouts of America, Boypower 76 Development Program, \$1,000

to help hire staff for disadvantaged areas; Emanuel Hospital, \$2,000 to assist its family planning program; Fruit and Flower Day Nursery, \$2,000 for new playground equipment; Goodwill Industries of Oregon, \$1,000 to assist its goal to be debt free by 1973; Intercom, \$1,000 to help problemed parents and youth.

Metropolitan 4-C Council, \$2,500 to begin a day care center for the Sellwood area in Southeast Portland; Oregon 4-H Foundation, \$2,500 to remodel a building; Oregon Museum of Science and Industry, \$1,500 to assist its outreach program for deprived children;

Oregon Halfway House, \$500 to assist its program in helping ex-convicts; Our Lady of Providence Child Center, \$1,000 for new equipment; Parry Center for Children; \$1,000 to support its program helping disturbed children.

Portland Center for Hearing and Speech, \$1,000 to help pay mortgage; Portland Rescue Mission, \$1,000 for building repair; St. Philip's Cooperative Pre-school, \$700 for building repair; The Volunteers of America, \$1,000 to help construct a new family center; and Waverly Children's Home, \$2,000 to outfit bedrooms in a new residential building.

Harman said the money is available under the terms of the trust to any charitable organization in the state.

"We are certain that organizations which truly need these funds exist in every section of Oregon, and we hope that all of them will ask to be considered this year," he said. Guidelines set up by an advisory committee state that they generally favor projects of significance to Oregon that lack the usual base solicitation. But to a limited degree, operating funds will be provided for temporary or experimental projects when broad public support is expected to be forthcoming.

Application should be addressed to the Trust Department, First National Bank of Oregon, P.O. Box 2971, Portland, Oregon 97208, in care of Harry C. Clair III, assistant trust officer.

According to Harman, requests should be filed in August or early September so that information is current when the advisory committee meets in October.

The trust was established by J.G. Edwards who at one time owned the largest sheep herd in the United States.

Recipients are selected by an advisory committee appointed by First National Bank, to offer

specific recommendations after studying requests from non-profit organizations, Moe M. Tonkon, attorney at law, serves as chairman of the committee. Members are William T. Branson, president of Blue Cross of Oregon; William H. Hunt, president of Georgia-Pacific Corporation; William E. Roberts, B & D Development Co.; Robert H. Short, vice president at Portland General Electric Co.; and Fred A. Stickle, general manager of the Oregonian.
