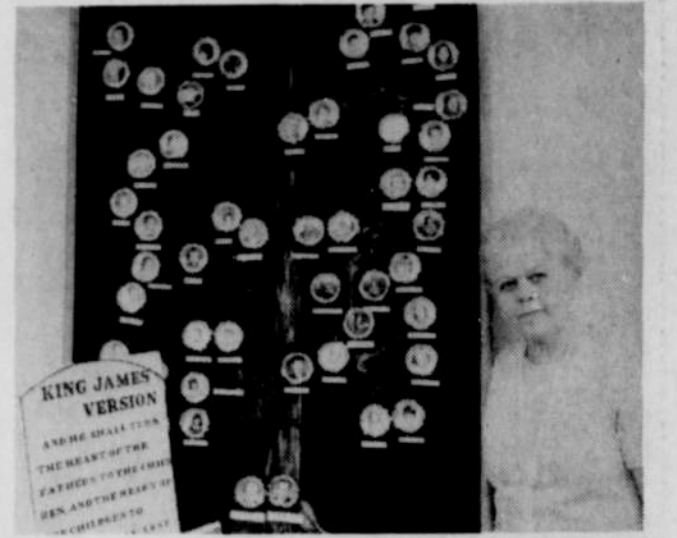
Refreshments were served by Mrs. Glenn Marcum and Mrs. Bud Sappe.

OUT OF THE PAST

10 YEARS AGO

Representing the Adrian area Boys' and Girls' State June 10-16 will be four Adrian High students. The delegates include Dianne Smith, Karla Kreigh, Michael Hastriter and David Looney.

Plans for the Malheur county community college are now being formulated since no objections were raised against the presented budget. Total operating budget of \$134,000 for the first year of operation was approved at the public hearing Wednesday, April 18 at the county court house in Vale. Immediate problem facing the college board is setting up of the curriculum and planning for a temporary location. Hiring of faculty will take place after President Eugene Voris arrives in May. Opening of the school is planned in September.

20 YEARS AGO

George Adams, who celebrated his 83rd birthday Tuesday, has made his home in the valley for 62 years. He came to Nyssa by wagon train in 1890 and has seen the valley develop from a sage brush desert. It was about frost time, Mr. Adams recalled, when he

arrived here after traveling for many weeks on the Oregon Trail by wagon train from Dawes County, Nebraska. A party of eight wagons left Nebraska just after July 4th, in 1890.

Mr. Adams located on what is now the old home place, owned by Robert and Alfred Adams, his sons. In 1903 he bought 155 acres on the Owyhee River south of Nyssa. At the time there was very little but sagebrush there and no settlers below the Owyhee Junction.

Nyssa consisted of three houses and a section house, the postoffice was located in one of the homes where the section crew ate. At the site of the Amalgamated Sugar Company plant was a large ranch house occupied by the John Lackey family. There was only one house located between Nyssa and Ontario, that of the Emerson family. Ontario was made up of the railroad depot, a hotel, two saloons and a general store.

Times were hard in 1896, Mr. Adams took a job carrying mail to Idaho City, then undergoing a gold mining boom. He traveled on skis all but four months of the year when he delivered mail by horseback. Flour and sugar were selling for a dollar a pound.

The flood of 1910, before the Owyhee Dam was built, covered his entire ranch, forcing the family to move but the house was undamaged.

He was instrumental in organizing a local Grange in his community about 30 years ago. The area was not fully developed and the organization was disbanded a short time later. He became a member of the Oregon Trail Grange about seven years ago and seldom misses a meeting.

30 YEARS AGO

The Nyssa mobile farm labor camp, one of the oldest in the Snake River Valley, was officially opened Monday. Ormand Thomas is manager.

Approximately 400 men between the ages of 45 and 65 registered in Nyssa Saturday through Monday under the selective service program. The men represent the last class to be registered under the present draft system.

The registration was the largest since the first registration. Many of the men served in the armed services during the first world war.

40 YEARS AGO

Like the great cattle ranches that made their exit with changing conditions after the west grew older, the immense holdings of the Northwestern Orchards Company in Apple Valley, across the river from Nyssa, have come to a parting of the ways. The entire orchard has been separated into sub-divisions. Some of the orchards will be pulled, some of the best will be rented as apple orchard land. About 1600 trees are being pulled on what is known as the Fred Fisher division.

Onions are still aristocrats in the vegetable kingdom with Oregon growers getting as high as \$7 a hundred for U.S. No 1 Yellows.
