Favorite Foods

I've surely been unhappy with the weather reports the last few days, "cherries frozen", "apple crop hurt", "temperature down to 21 degrees". The valley was filled with smoke the other morning. I do hope some of the fruit was saved. The first "fruit" we have in our garden is "good old" rhubarb.

FROZEN RHUBARB JAM

4 cups rhubarb, cut into small chunks
4 cups sugar
2 tbsp. water
1-3 oz. pkg. strawberry gelatin
Mix rhubarb, sugar and water and let stand overnight. The next morning cook gently until tender. Remove from heat and add strawberry gelatin. Stir until dissolved. Pour into freezer jars and cool. Cover and freeze.

The grocery stores are beginning to display fresh strawberries and they reminded me of a recipe I have using fresh

strawberries. Strawberries are high in Vitamin C and we need this every day. I do think tho that we aren't thinking of food value or calories when we see a luscious slice of fresh strawberry pie!

FRESH STRAWBERRY PIE

1 9-inch pie shell
1/2 cup powdered sugar
1 quart fresh strawberries
1 cup water
2 tablespoons cornstarch
3/4 cup granulated sugar
Red food coloring
Stir powdered sugar into 3 cups of the berries (select large berries for this). Let stand 1 hour. Crush remaining cup of smaller berries. Cook with water about 2 minutes and sieve. Mix cornstarch and sugar and stir into berry juice. Cook until clear, stirring constantly. Add a few drops of food coloring if desired. Fill pie shell with large berries and pour hot sauce over all. Cool and serve with whipped cream. Garnish with fresh berries. Serves 6.

USE CAUTION WITH ASPARAGUS

Some Treasure Valley, asparagus found on ditch banks and various rights of way may have pesticide contamination that makes it unsafe for human consumption, according to Malheur County Extension Agent Leeds Bailey.

He says that chemicals used to control weeds on some of these areas do not have federal and state registration for use on food crops. Also that the drift of insecticides from application to crops in nearby field can contaminate the newly emerging asparagus spears.

number of waste places and other areas that receive water but not intensive weed control. Each spring numerous Treasure Valley residents can be seen harvesting the crops along roads, ditch banks and other

places the crop is found. Bailey suggests that these people check with farmers or other persons responsible for the rights of way to be sure the area is free of pesticide contamination.



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
