ADRIAN VOTES 36-0 TO INCORPORATE

Adrian voters approved incorporation unanimously Monday, and as a result will become Oregon's newest incorporated city. Thirty-six voters gave their approval, and there was no opposition.

An area of about one square mile has been designated as the official city limits, and the new city's population is about 160. Incorporation will provide a legal body to help solve problems facing the residents of Adrian, particularly sewer and water systems.

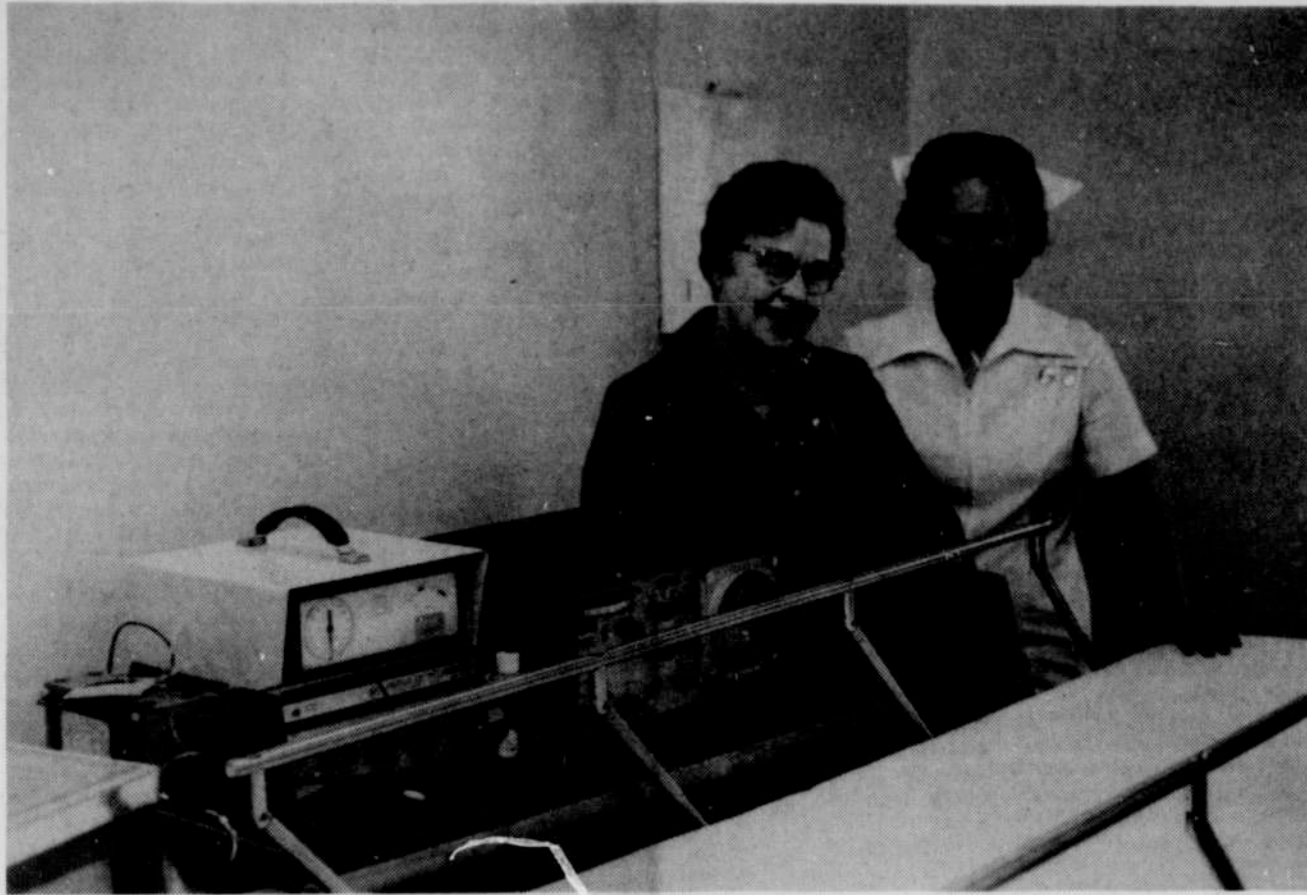
Eight Capture Top Honors

Former Nyssa Boy Drowns In Hell's Canyon Accident

Tragedy struck on the Snake River, Thursday, April 18, just before noon when a young rancher, Gary Wilson, was involved in a boating accident and disappeared in the swift current of the river.

Wilson, 23, disappeared in the water shortly after the 18-foot boat in which he and his brother Ray Wilson, 28, were riding rolled over and pitched the two men into the water. Lem Wilson, father of the two young men and a former Nyssaan, witnessed the accident. He said that his two sons had just left the boat dock at Pittsburgh Landing, heading toward Christmas Creek, when the motor on the boat quit and they began drifting downstream. The boat began to sink, then bobbed to the surface in a rapids, then capsized.

Wilson, a well known pilot, had his airplane nearby and began immediately to search for his son by flying between the canyon walls where he thought he would surface.

Two men, Floyd Held of Clarkston and Earl Pea of Gifford, came down the river just shortly after the accident and found Ray Wilson clinging to a gasoline can. They rescued him but were not able to find Gary.

Later in the day Idaho County Sheriff Gene Fuzzell flew with Wilson along the stretch of river from Pittsburgh down to Christmas Creek and they were joined by another aircraft from Grangeville to search the river. However the search turned up no sign of the missing man.

A patrol boat from Lewiston and other friends and neighbors of the Wilsons joined in a search of the river but high and muddy water hampered efforts and no trace of Gary could be found.

Shelley's duties will consist of heading the publicity efforts at NHS. Capturing the five varsity yell leader positions were Lillian Moore, Rex Schilling, newcomers, and LeAnn Bair, Trish Wahler and Pam Stephens, holdover cheerleaders from the current year. Rex is the first male cheerleader to represent Nyssa in many years.

MALHEUR MEMORIAL HOSPITAL TO OBSERVE "OPEN HOUSE" SUNDAY

The opportunity to learn more about health care in general and about hospitals in particular will be available next week when Malheur Memorial Hospital joins with 7,000 hospitals throughout the nation in observing National Hospital Week.

Mr. Ernest King, administrator of the hospital, said that Malheur Memorial Hospital's plans for the week include "Open House" Sunday, 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. All areas of the hospital will be open to the public and children are welcome. Mr. King especially invited Jr. High and High School students to come.

Among the areas not usually seen by the public will be the recently equipped recovery room, which includes a cardiac defibrillator, a heart monitor and the recovery cart purchased by the Frank Parr Memorial Funds. The surgery areas and the obstetrical department will also be open. Coffee and punch will be served by the Auxiliary.

Mr. King explained that National Hospital Week traditionally is observed during the week that includes Florence Nightingale's birthday in recognition of her pioneer work in hospital care. "But hospitals have changed radically since her time, when they were little more than shelters for the hopelessly ill," he said. "Today, they are complex arrangements of services for both the sick and the well. Malheur Memorial Hospital, though small in comparison to many hospitals, is equipped to provide many of these services."

MEMORIAL FUND

The Memorial Fund for the Malheur Memorial Hospital was started when the hospital opened in 1950. Many pieces of equipment and furnishings have been purchased in memory of people

through the Memorial Fund. Usually money so donated goes into the general Memorial Fund, then is used as needed. However, if a family desires, a special use may be made of a memorial and a separate accounting is kept of that fund.

There have been many individual items provided in this manner. The rooms that have been provided are the patient room in memory of Warren and Wilda Farmer, the doctor's library in memory of J. J. Sarazin, M.D. and most recently the recovery room in memory of Frank Parr. Both the Sarazin Library and the Parr Recovery room are continuing memorials in that the family and friends add to these funds to improve the rooms.

The recovery room is located next to the surgery in what formerly was a storage room for various equipment. After surgery, a patient is placed on the recovery cart, which is a specially made hospital bed on which the patient may be put in various positions, and has equipment for I.V.'s, oxygen etc. to be immediately available. The patient is then wheeled into the recovery room and remains there under constant supervision until he is out of the anaesthetic and can be moved into his regular patient room. The heart monitor and defibrillator are part of the recovery room equipment.

Most of this equipment in the recovery room is portable and may be used throughout the hospital if necessary. It will all be on display Sunday during "Open House".

The hospital is very grateful for the interest shown in the Memorial Fund.

A list of memorials is kept in the Memorial Book located in the front lobby of the hospital.

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TWO ELECTED TO SCHOOL BOARD

Victor Haburchak was re-elected to the Nyssa School Board in voting Monday at the annual school election, and Bill Schilling was elected to a four-year term presently filled by Harold Kutz, board chairman, who did not run. Nyssa voters also approved the Intermediate Education District levy by a vote of 242 to 218.

464 voters turned out for the election. In the individual races, Haburchak pulled 276 votes to 184 for Larry Bauman. Bill Schilling was given 329 votes to 122 for Ed Wade.

County-wide, voters approved the IED levy by 940 to 655. Adrian voters approved their school budget of \$273,307, and re-elected Carl Hill, who was unopposed, to the school board. Gerrit Timmerman was re-elected to the IED board.

Vickie Lane is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Keith Lane of Route 1 Nyssa. Vickie is very active in school. She is captain of the drill team; co-editor of the school paper; secretary of GAA; Honor Society treasurer; and will be the student body secretary for the coming year. She is a member of the pep club, Hi-Y, FHA, GAA, Honor Society, drill team, Thespians, band, chorus and also a member of the student council.

The Adrian American Legion not only chooses the girls to go to State but also finance the girls trip in June.

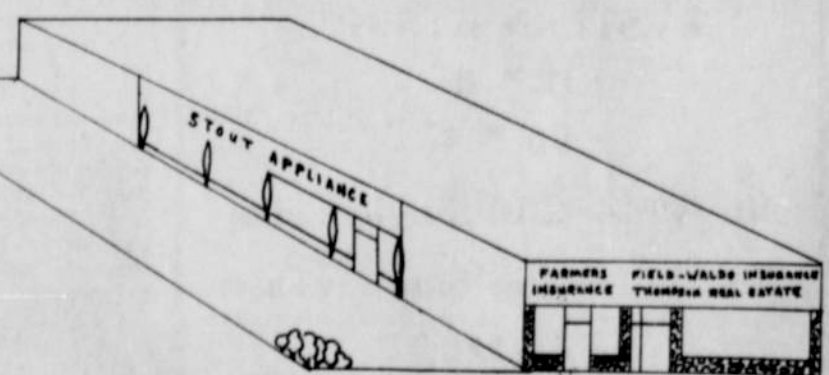
The Symposium was sponsored and funded by the United States Army Research Office - Durham and hosted by Duke University, North Carolina State University, University of North Carolina, and the Research Triangle Institute. Over 300 students attended from all parts of the nation.

Highlights of the conference included a visit to the famous Morehead Planetarium where Astronaut Russell Schweickart spoke to the group and demonstrated the use of the Planetarium in space training. Dr. Guy Owen, southern novelist and author of "The Flam Man", spoke on his views of Southern culture. A special choral program was presented by the Duke University Chorale. A slide discussion on the Search for Creatures at Loch Ness was conducted by Mr. Robert Rines, President of the Academy of Applied Science. Dr. Bernard Boyd gave a presentation on Archeology in the Holy Land.
