



The recovery room is located next to the surgery in what formerly was a storage room for various equipment. After surgery, a patient is placed on the recovery cart, which is a specially made hospital bed on which the patient may be put in various positions, and has equipment for I V's, oxygen etc. to be immediately available. The patient is then wheeled into the recovery room and remains there under constant supervision until he is out of the anaesthetic and can be moved into his regular patient room. The heart monitor and defibrillator are part of the recovery room equipment.

Most of this equipment in the recovery room is portable and may be used throughout the hospital if necessary. It will all be on display Sunday during


