Applications Sought For Range Youth Camp

Applications are now being sought for boys interested in attending the annual Oregon Youth Range Camp at Lake Creek in August. Interested boys between the ages of 14 and 17 who have demonstrated leadership qualities in school or community may apply to attend. Successful candidates will be selected on the basis of information and recommendations from their applications. Those selected will receive an all expense paid scholarship to attend the camp. Lynn Todd, Malheur County Chairman of the Society for Range Management, said applications must be submitted to him by May 11.

Boys attending will have an opportunity to gain experience and training in range and related resources during the August 6-12 camp at the Lake Creek Recreation Center in Logan Valley on the south side of Strawberry Mountain.

Those who attend will learn the basic concepts of resource management in a setting where range, soils, forest, wildlife, and recreation are all clearly illustrated, Todd noted.

Sixth Graders On Field Tour

Between 600 and 700 sixth grade students from Malheur county schools will participate in the third annual environmental education field tour May 4 and 5, according to Robert E. Currier, chairman of the sponsoring Outdoor Education Advisory Committee for Malheur County. The students will be divided into two groups for the two-day session to facilitate travel and instruction.

Two study sites have been set up for the students, one on Lytle Boulevard, the other in the Owyhee Canyon. Plant investigation, soils and fire control will be presented at the Lytle Boulevard station and fisheries, wildlife and geology at the Owyhee station. The boys and girls, who will be transported by bus, will receive continuous instruction by observation of wildlife habitats, various farm management practices, etc. while enroute to the two sites.

Serving as instructors will be representatives from various resource groups including the Oregon State Game Commission, Soil Conservation, BLM, Extension, and TVCC, assisted by sixth grade teachers.

Parma Woman Dies Of Stab Wound

A 36-year-old Parma woman died last week from injuries sustained from a self-inflicted stab wound in the abdomen, Canyon County Sheriff Dale G. Halle said Monday. Halle said his office was not notified at the time Mrs. Nancy Arlowene Gifford, a deaf-mute, was injured, and only learned of the death Friday.

Mrs. Gifford and a son, Charles, 9, lived in a small apartment in Parma. She had been in the company of a man earlier in the evening, April 25, the sheriff said.

Daugherty had visited his nephew at the home, and left, returning later to hear the child screaming.

Halle said Daugherty found his sister with a stab wound sitting in a chair with her head on the table. A knife with blood on it was in the sink. He told the sheriff he took his sister to the Nyssa hospital, because it was closer, and did not report details of the stabbing to Parma police "because no one asked him."

She was admitted last Tuesday night, April 25 and died Wednesday morning, Halle found after conducting an investigation.

Halle said all indications are that the stabbing was self-inflicted.
