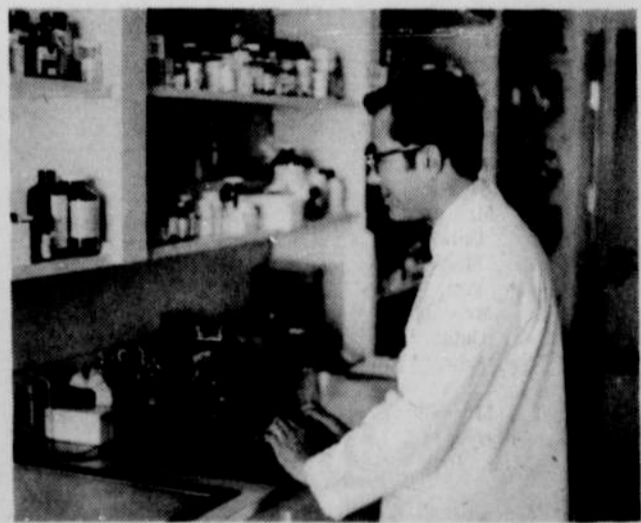
Delroy Mathews, laboratory supervisor, is doing a differential blood count with the microscope.



Mrs. Ellen Mills, Medical Record Technician. Every medical record since the hospital opened in 1950 is on file in this office.



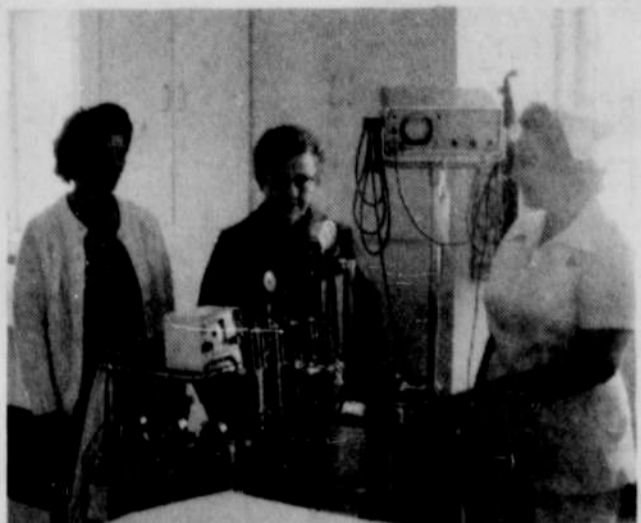
Mrs. Vera Wilhite is operating the NCR 400 accounting machine, on which all of the hospital's business records are prepared.
