Snow-Capped Strawberry Pancakes



Western States Move To Help Dairy Program

trict, Bureau of Land Mana- Washington and California have joined together to strengthen non-brand milk and dairy products promotion, it is announced by Ray Kozak, executive secretary of the Oregon Dairy Products Commission.

Kozak noted that all three states use the "Every Body Needs Milk" theme.

At a recent meeting in California, dairy farmer board members of the Oregon Dairy Products Commission, Washington Dairy Products Commission and the California Milk Advisory Board agreed on program plans which will utilize the services and talents of the individual advertising agencies of each state, Primary purpose of the cooperative effort of the three dairy organizations will be to share creative and

Dairy farmers in Oregon, production costs in the development of newspaper, television, radio, magazine, billboard and merchandising advertising materials.

"The end result would be a saving to each state in production and creative costs, with the sharing of a pool of materials available to all three states, financed by each on a pro-rata basis," Kozak said.

Kozak emphasized that each state commission will continue to maintain and direct individual in-state advertising and promotion.

'All Oregon dairy advertising will be supervised by the Oregon commission and will continue to be represented by Thuemmel, Marx and Associates, Portland advertising and public relations agency," Kozak



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
