It seemed somewhat different to have four foot snow drifts on each side of the highway as they drove along. Nyssa still seemed good to come back to.

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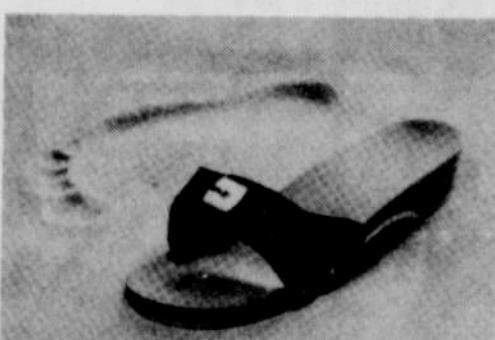
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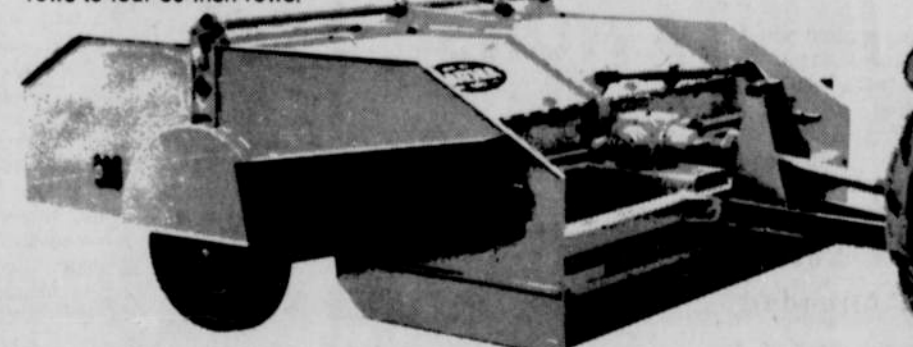
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
