1. More College services taken to the surrounding communities. More adult education classes and seminars taught right in the community centers.
2. Greater recruitment program within the High Schools of the College District. Closer coordination with guidance counselors in the High Schools and a concerted effort to see that every high school senior meets a college instructor in his field of interest.
3. Provide for tuition credit for commuting students and District dormitory students in order to equalize advantage held by Ontario residents.
4. Greater emphasis on the Gift Foundation as source of working capital with a more aggressive program of direct mail and personal contact with prospective donors.
5. Get a tax base to give students and instructors the security they need whereby they can be assured of the stability of the college. It won't cost the taxpayers one cent more to have a tax base with responsible management.
6. Capital Equipment--Provide for a computer Services Center to help teach the latest business and mathematical techniques to students. The Center would be available for shared time to local businesses and other schools to help pay the operating costs.
7. I would like to see more open communication between the college and the public, between the college board and the teachers Association, and between the administration and the teachers.
8. Future Planning for a College building program. This should provide for a complete learning center, auditorium, theatre and football stadium.
9. Provide a more wholesome atmosphere for dormitory students so that they may have better study facilities, better eating conditions and more supervisory control for up-graded moral standards.
10. Greater tie-in of our vocational technical facilities and instructors with the I. E. D. and High School vocational Educational programs to eliminate duplication of facilities and effort.
