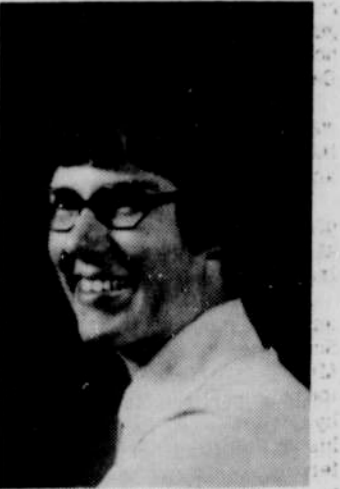
"Charlie Brown," was presented in April to capacity crowds. Gary Condon, director stated there have been reports that many people did not get to attend because of the limited seating.
