BLM Controls Two Range Fires

Acreage burned from two recent fires in the Vale District, Bureau of Land Management, was kept at a minimum because of quick action by ranchers in the respective fire areas, District Manager George R. Gurr said this week.

A 35-acre blaze which started from a feed yard two miles north of Brogan and burned toward public lands late Saturday afternoon was controlled by eight ranchers using heavy equipment. The fire was reported out shortly after 8 p.m. by Per Diem Guard Francis Domy of Brogan. It had been reported earlier to the Vale Fire Control office by Mark Vilmeyer.

A second fire was reported at 3 p.m. Monday by Oregon State Police near Cow Lakes and approximately 14 miles northwest of Jordan Valley. A three-man pumper crew and spotter plane were dispatched by the fire control office. The blaze, held to three acres, was contained by two local ranchers by the time the pumper crew arrived.

Gurr expressed his appreciation for the responsive action taken by ranchers on the fires. Both were suspected to be man caused.

Open Letter to Malheur Citizens
From your present County Treasurer

This was a quiet primary election for me, and I wish to thank each and every voter for coming to the polls to cast his vote . . . to keep our "GOVERNMENT OF THE PEOPLE, BY THE PEOPLE AND FOR THE PEOPLE" alive.

I would like to encourage the young people of our area to become interested and involved in community and government affairs. We need to regain our patriotism and pride for our county, which must start at home and ripple on out through our cities, counties, and states. If we keep "leaving everything up to George", it will get away from us . . . if it hasn't already. I think our way of life is still worth putting our shoulders to the wheel and pulling together. Sure, it takes time and courage and sacrifices. But it's worth it if we can get a lot of good qualified citizens to participate on committees and seek elective offices. Competition is good for everyone. This would give us the best kind of government . . . keep us on our toes . . . and may the most dedicated, qualified person win.

Since some of you are new to the area, I would like to get acquainted with you. August 1st of this year will be my 20th anniversary with OUR COUNTY . . . (yours and mine), starting as the Sheriff's secretary. Eight months later, I became his Deputy Tax Collector . . . "ready or not". The sudden vacancy needed filling. Whew!! What a job!! In December 1963, almost 10 years later, another sudden vacancy occurred . . . our County Treasurer passed away. You guessed it . . . I got the appointment. The primary election in 1964 was a tough one for me . . . I had to beat the brush for votes and won by a slim margin. By election time in 1968 I had the office under control with a good investment program started. Since no one filed against me, I used the opportunity to "Report to the People" all of the varied duties of the office, as well as the growth of income for the county and districts, together with increased work, which the new investment program created. The office needed a part-time deputy in case of another "sudden vacancy" and I needed public support to attain one. I really enjoyed reporting to you, the people, because you all could see and appreciate the "harvest" as well as I . . . like, for instance: \$45,621.93 interest earned in 1966-67 compared to \$12,227.15 earned in 1964-65.

I was wondering what I could do this election year. When I took a look at my old graphs and charts, I was astonished and became quite excited again. I would like to show you why. I'd appreciate an invitation to speak to your group . . . large or small . . . and become acquainted with all newcomers as well as visit with my old friends.
