FIRE DANGER HIGH IN VALE BLM AREA

All areas, particularly the northern area, are quite dry, and lack of rainfall in the past weeks has contributed to the fire danger.

SPEAKING OF BOOKS

One can never emphasize too strongly the importance of reading in a civilized liberal society, for without a constant intake, so to speak, of the world's knowledge, little can we hope to better ourselves either personally or collectively. In previous columns I have talked about books which are important as classics or books which are exceptionally well written, but not necessarily classics. This summer I would like to talk about books for leisure time reading.

It is no accident that in the United States the press is protected. Through reading one can share any experience, any thought from hundreds of lives and situations in any period of man's recorded history. Knowledge, be it written as a novel or a scholarly work, becomes part of the reader's own intellect, and this is what books, and particularly good books, are about.

Comparing organ transplants with books, one might note that while transplants can prolong life, man nevertheless will die intellectually unless he transplants a painless and exciting procedure--new knowledge within himself.

Reading is perhaps life's most exciting and challenging experience. Through books we transcend time and space. All knowledge is ours to possess. For the bold, read with eagerness; to the timid, beware, for what you read may shake the very foundations of your prejudices and beliefs--opening to you new ideas of reason. But you say, "I don't have time to read." I can only skim the morning newspaper. Ah--how we Americans in 1972 are always on the go. Yet, just fifteen minutes of reading after each meal daily plus fifteen minutes with a book at bedtime is seven hours a week, and the occasional replacing of a television program or a coffee break with a book means even more reading time.

The time we allow for reading reflects the importance we each place on non-material values; the purpose of books is reflected in a question posed by a professor friend of mine who asked, "What have you read recently that either significantly contributed to your knowledge or affected your life?" I might also add another question, "What have you read recently to give you pleasure and relaxation from the trials and tribulations of daily living?"

All of the books that I plan to talk about during these summer months of recreation and outdoor living are available at the Nyssa Public Library and for those of you who don't want to check out a cumbersome, hard-bound book, all of these books are also available in relatively inexpensive paperback editions.

Pvt. Wm. Stradley

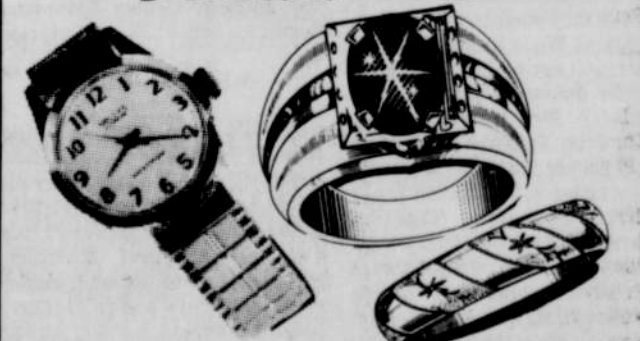
