Governor Sponsors Measure For Educational Benefits

Governor Tom McCall announced today he will sponsor a measure in the 1973 Legislature to provide educational benefits for dependents of Oregon servicemen and civilians killed in the line of duty, or who are prisoners of war or listed as missing in action in Southeast Asia.

McCall's proposed legislation would provide up to 36 months of exemption from tuition and fees for qualifying dependents. Those eligible would be any child or unmarried spouse of an Oregon serviceman or civilian killed in Southeast Asia or Korea after August 4, 1964, or who is listed as missing in action or is a prisoner of war as the result of service in the Vietnam-Era. August 5, 1964, is the date of official entry by the United States into the Vietnam conflict.

The legislation also would provide payment to the dependents of \$100 for each school quarter for reasonable expenses.

Eligible dependents would be entitled to attend either a four-year, public institution of higher education or a public vocational-technical school without payment of tuition and fees.

McCall revealed at the National Governors' Conference

in Houston this week that he would introduce the legislation. He made the announcement after moving for adoption by the Conference of a resolution proposed by Governor Edgar D. Whitcomb of Indiana.

More than 1,700 U.S. military personnel and about 50 U.S. civilians are prisoners of war or missing in action in Southeast Asia, McCall said. The Governors' Conference resolution said, "The plight of these men and the anguish of their families have been widely documented and are matters of deep national concern." The resolution expresses support for state programs, especially educational benefits, to assist the dependents of those killed, missing in action or who are prisoners of war.

The State Department of Veterans' Affairs has estimated that approximately 100 widows of servicemen or civilians would be eligible, and an estimated 120 to 200 dependent children.

McCall said not all of these would be expected to take advantage of the benefits. Further, he said, not all of the children would be in school at one time because of their varying ages, and as a result the annual cost would not be significantly high.

Home Builders Must Register Under New Act

Home builder, home remodelers and building sub-contractors who work on single family residences and small apartment structures were reminded this week that they should apply now for registration under the Oregon Contractors' Registration Act, which goes into effect July 1, 1972.

William R. Lamb, Portland, chairman of the new Oregon Builders Board, said it is vitally important to builders that they be registered on time in order to carry on business after July 1.

An unregistered builder or sub-contractor will not be able to submit legal bids, or do any work on contracts nor will cities or counties be able to issue building permits to those not having registration certificates. Lamb pointed out. He emphasized that unregistered builders cannot bring suit for either compensation or break of contract under terms of the act.

Lamb, himself a builder with 20 years experience, said the new act will benefit consumers as well as builders. Thirty-four states now have a similar means of consumer protection against "fly-by-night" and unethical contractors. The new law requires proof of responsibility from all people contracting for pay in construction, repair and remodeling work on structures of residential nature less than three stories high and having less than 4,000 square feet of floor space.

When consumer grievances arise, the Builders Board will serve as a mediation panel between the aggrieved consumer and the builder as well as between builders and sub-contractors. The board has powers to revoke the licenses of builders who fail to fulfill contract obligations or to pay court judgment against them for negligent or improper work.

The act requires home builders to post surety bonds of \$3,000 and sub-contractors of \$1,000 to insure protection for consumers, taxing authorities and suppliers of material or equipment. Assigned savings accounts or certificates of deposit may be substituted for surety bonds.

Applicants for registration must also show proof that their businesses are properly registered for industrial accident insurance, and employment and

income taxes and that they carry liability insurance to minimum requirements of \$25,000 for property damage, \$50,000 for injury or death to one person and \$100,000 for injury or death to more than one person.

The annual fee for home builders is \$20 and for sub-contractors \$10.

Application forms are available from the Builders Board, 204 Commerce Building, Salem, Oregon 97310; from Department of Commerce field offices in Pendleton, Coos Bay, Medford, Portland and Eugene; or from the local permit-writing agencies. Banks, savings and loan companies, insurance companies and building industry trade associations can be helpful in providing information and completing the forms.

Favorite Foods

What's a cook out without baked beans? How about a picnic? They go hand in hand. I like baked beans but many times I don't take time to start from scratch so I cook these quickly. Everyone likes them, especially me.

BLITZ BAKED BEANS

2-lb. cans baked beans
1/3 cup catsup
2 teaspoons dry mustard
1/4 cup molasses
1/2 teaspoon accent
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt

4 bacon slices, cut in half
Thoroughly mix all ingredients except bacon, pour into a 1 1/2 quart casserole and lay bacon slices on top. Bake 30 minutes in 350 degree oven. Serves 6.

CHEESE TOPPED B. BEANS

You might omit the bacon slices and sprinkle the top of seasoned baked beans with grated sharp Cheddar Cheese, the last 10 minutes of baking time.

EASY BARBECUE SAUCE

1/4 cup chopped onion
4 tbsp. sugar
1/8 tsp. pepper
1/4 cup catsup
3 tbsp. vinegar
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
Mix ingredients and cook over low heat for 5 minutes.

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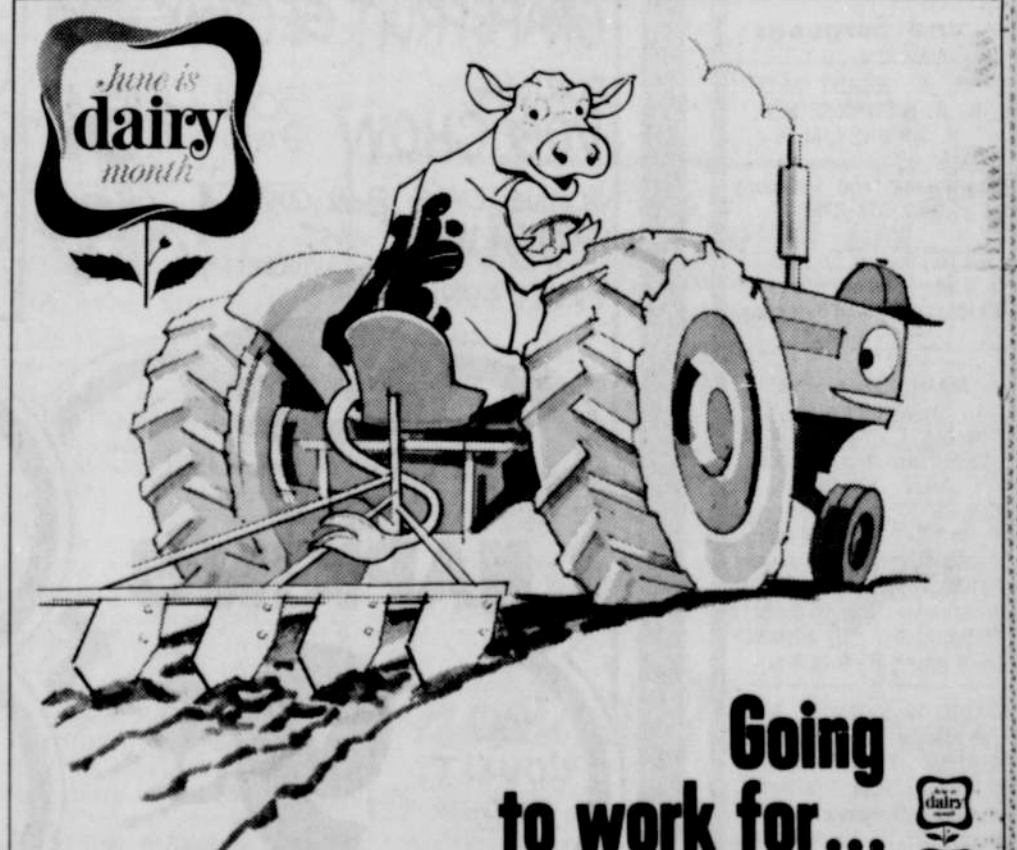
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
