Favorite Foods

How about making salads that set up in your refrigerator? We'd like to climb into the refrigerator ourselves on these hot days, wouldn't we?

Home Ec. students in our valley vote the refrigerator to be the most important appliance. Personally, I feel the range rates the #1 spot.

Here's a gelatin salad which is a bit different.

GINGER ALE-LIME SALAD
1 pkg lime gelatin
1/2 cup boiling water
1 cup miniature marshmallows
1 7-oz. bottle ginger ale
1/2 cup celery chopped
1/2 cup nuts, chopped (optional)
1 cup cream, whipped

Add gelatin to hot water, add marshmallows and stir until dissolved. Add ginger ale, and refrigerate until the consistency of egg whites. Fold in nuts, celery and whipped cream. Return to refrigerator and store until set. Serves 6.

Speaking of different, an old saying goes "Don't judge a book by its cover". So—please don't judge, the next salad by its diversified ingredients.

Surprise your family and guests with a salad having raspberry, tomato and seafood all mixed together. It's really a pleasant surprise!

TOMATO - SEA FOOD SALAD
2 pkgs raspberry flavored gelatin

4 cups tomato juice
1 tablespoon grated onion
1 cup celery, chopped
1 can shrimp, tuna, or crab
1 tablespoon vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon Accent

Prepare gelatin, using the tomato juice instead of water. Cool and add remaining ingredients. Pour into mold and when set, serve on crisp lettuce leaf and top with mayonnaise. Serves 8.

Mobile Home Owners Should Take Precautions

Surviving a mobile home fire often requires a quick exit within seconds after detection of the blaze, the Insurance Information Institute warns Oregon's 31,155 mobile home owners.

Although the frequency of fires in mobile homes is half that in other structures, once a fire starts, the chances of being killed in a mobile home are nearly three times that in other residences, the Institute reports.

The average dollar loss in a mobile home fire has recently climbed higher than house fires, too, the Institute notes. A fire in a mobile home is three to four times more likely to cause a total loss.

Fire is transmitted swiftly through the mobile home's thin walls, air spaces above ceilings and along carpets; however, carbon monoxide poisoning is a greater danger to the occupants. The fire rapidly consumes all the oxygen in the small living space and fills it with the deadly gas.

It is essential, the Institute says, to inspect your mobile home with fire safety in mind.

Certification

Deadline, July 1

Producers have to certify their compliance under the 1972 SET-ASIDE FARM PROGRAMS AND THEIR SEEDED SUGAR-BEET ACREAGE. Deadline for certification in Malheur County is July 1, according to Blaine Girvin, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

Girvin urges early certification in order to avoid "standing in line".

A producer must complete his certification before he can receive any set-aside payment or earn his conditional sugar-beet payment.

To certify, a producer signs a statement at the County ASCS Office showing the acreages devoted to various crops under the 1972 farm programs. At the same time, he designates the amount and location of his set-aside acres.

There should be adequate fire walls around the furnace and appliances, properly protected wiring, and exits immediately accessible from all rooms, particularly bedrooms. Families should also make fire escape plans and hold drills.

Fires will threaten the lives of nearly 1,000 Oregon residents and cause an estimated \$250,000 damage to mobile homes during 1972, the Institute reports. Those families who have taken fire prevention precautions and have ready exits are less likely to be counted among the 6,000 Americans who will die in home fires across the nation this year than those who do not.
