Stampeder Tickets
Now On Sale

Tickets for the 57th annual Snake River Stampede in Nampa went on sale June 15 in the Stampede office in Nampa at the Chamber of Commerce, according to Gary Doorn, ticket chairman.

"All tickets, including general admission, reserve and children's tickets may be purchased by mail, or at the Stampede Office", Doorn said.

He continued, "If tickets are purchased through the mail, it is necessary that all information be included in the request, such as: the number of tickets, general admission or reserve and a check or money order. Ticket prices are \$3.75 for all reserve seats, \$2.75 for adult's general admission and \$1.50 for children. Other information needed is the purchaser's name and mailing address."

All tickets for the Snake River Stampede will go on sale beginning July 5th in Boise and at the curb side booth in Nampa.

Parents Should Immunize
Children Against Polio

Paralytic polio could strike Oregon children in large numbers this summer because only 50 percent of them are adequately immunized against the crippling disease, Dr. Edward Press, Oregon State Public Health Officer, warned today. Dr. Press cited recent surveys of first graders in 10 Oregon counties, including Multnomah and Washington, which showed an average immunity level against polio of 50 percent, with a high of 64 percent and a low of 23 percent.

"It's alarming to think one-half of our children aren't safe from polio in an age where the disease can be prevented by a few feedings of oral vaccine," Dr. Press said. "Apparently, many parents have forgotten the years before polio vaccine was developed when the disease killed and crippled thousands of children during epidemics."

A first grader is considered fully immunized against polio after receiving four feedings of oral polio vaccine, two in the first year of life, a booster at about 18 months of age and another prior to school entry. "Oregon hasn't had a case of polio reported since 1965,"

Dr. Press said, "and that probably is the reason parents have become complacent about getting their children immunized. But we know from epidemics elsewhere in recent years that Oregon, with its low immunity levels, could experience an outbreak of polio this summer should the virus be introduced in the community."

Dr. Press pointed out that polio immunization should be started when a child is two or three months of age, and urged parents of unimmunized children to consult their physician or local public health department for protection.

Pretty Little Indian Maids



These pretty girls dressed in Indian costumes are a group of girls who belong to the Eh-Capa riders who will be featured at the Nyssa Nite Rodeo Friday, July 7 and Saturday July 8 this year.

By popular demand the Eh-Capa (Apache spelled backwards) will again perform at the Nyssa Nite Rodeo. They appeared here two years ago but because of the rain a lot of people did not get to see the youngsters perform.

What started as a group of neighborhood children has mushroomed into a professional type group of riders.

Approximately ten years ago Wayne Stear of Boise noticed that in a community of horse lovers many of the neighborhood children either had horses and no place to ride, or did not have the expensive equipment that riding clubs demanded. Stear decided to do something about the situation.

Stear plowed up part of his property for an arena. Then he started teaching neighborhood children to ride. Some rode the Stears' horses, others either brought their own or borrowed horses. Before long, more and more youngsters appeared. Although not formally organized until two years later, that was the beginning of Eh-Capa Riding Club.

Stear believes that there is no better training in discipline and ability for both horses and riders than close order drill. For this reason, they decided to form a drilling organization.

The Eh-Capa's ride Indian style, their only piece of equipment being a tack rein, a narrow leather strap around the horse's neck. No saddles, pads, or blankets are used.

The tack rein teaches riding by balance and position instead of reliance on reins and saddles. As Stear said, "We start them whenever they are big enough to put a leg on each side of a horse and tell the youngsters to keep their minds in the middle."

You will have to see the ability of this group of boys and girls ages 8 to 20 to fully appreciate the work and time they have put in on their drills.
