OUT OF THE PAST

10 YEARS AGO **40 YEARS AGO**

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Wild are holding open house at their tire shop, all day Saturday, June 30 to which all their friends and customers are invited. The celebration being held on the 25th anniversary date of the establishment of their O.K. Rubber Welders shop.

Roy moved to Nyssa with his parents in 1937 from Rooks County, Kan. They opened their first O.K. Shop in May of 1937. The first year their receipts were \$7.50. Their gross the next year was \$1200 and by 1951 had increased to \$24,000. Roy purchased the business from his parents in 1947 and has operated it since.

Roy is totally blind, his blindness began in 1933. He learned to use his hands for all the operations necessary in the shop. He received an achievement certificate from the National Eagles Lodge for making outstanding adjustments as a handicapped person. He was chosen "Man of the Year" among all O.K. Rubber Welders of the U.S. at a Denver meeting. This May he was given special recognition and a 25-year service pin by the president of O.K. Rubber Welders at ceremonies in Littleton, Colo.

Roy in telling of his business and achievements, says his greatest was November 1952 when he talked Miss Georgia Nichol into becoming Mrs. Roy Wild.

Tuesday, June 21, the new federal tax went into effect to operate for two years or until June, 1974.

50 YEARS AGO

Mrs. James Conley, 80 years of age, who resided with her son J.W. Conley, on an island in Snake River, south of Nyssa, was struck by westbound passenger train No. 19, Sunday afternoon and hurled from the O.S.L. bridge into the swift current of Snake River.

The aged woman had attended a picnic at Johnson's grove, on an island in the river which the bridge spans. Becoming tired Mrs. Conley, against protest of her friends insisted on taking the bridge rather than wait for the boat that had carried the party over.

20 YEARS AGO

Midway of her passage over the ties, the picnic party was horrified to see the train swing around the curve at 40 miles an hour. The engineer at once sounded his whistle and applied the brakes. Mrs. Conley apparently did not hear the alarm and the train slowed to less than 20 miles an hour, struck her, hurling her into the river at which point was about 12 feet deep with a swift current.

The crew immediately searched along the river bank, but the body did not appear after striking the water. A watch was kept at all points below, while a crew of railroad men and residents dragged the river Sunday night.

No blame was laid to the train crew who did all in their power to avert the accident. The body was found on a sand bar on an island Monday a mile and a half below the bridge.
