

Fire Destroys 14,080 Acres

A total of ten Snake River Valley Fire crews were dispatched from the Vale Bureau of Land Management office, June 23 at 8 p.m. to a fire located about seven miles south of Rome in southern Malheur County. The fire, called the Winter Field Fire, consumed 14,080 acres of native range grasses and brush. Two Homedale crews, four from Nyssa, one each from Vale and Marsing and two from Ontario were dispatched to the fire along with six BLM pumper crews. A total of 14,000 gallons of retardant were dropped on

the fire by planes out of the Boise Inter-Agency Fire Center, along with 8,500 gallons of water. Fire bosses were Jerry Wilcox and Dave Hawk. Fifty fire personnel also fought the fire. The fire was contained around 10 p.m. Saturday but not controlled until Sunday morning, because the wind was so bad.

Alfalfa Seed Growers To Tour Canada

It will originate travel in Boise and pick up tour participants in

Malheur county, Umatilla county and the Columbia basin and continue on to the Alberta, Canada alfalfa seed producing area. The tour's itinerary includes a visit to the pollinator research station at Lethbridge. Extensive studies on the management of leafcutter bees for

alfalfa seed production are carried out there by Dr. G.A. Hobbs. Additional information on the tour is available at the Malheur, Canyon and Owyhee County Extension Offices. All interested persons are invited to participate.

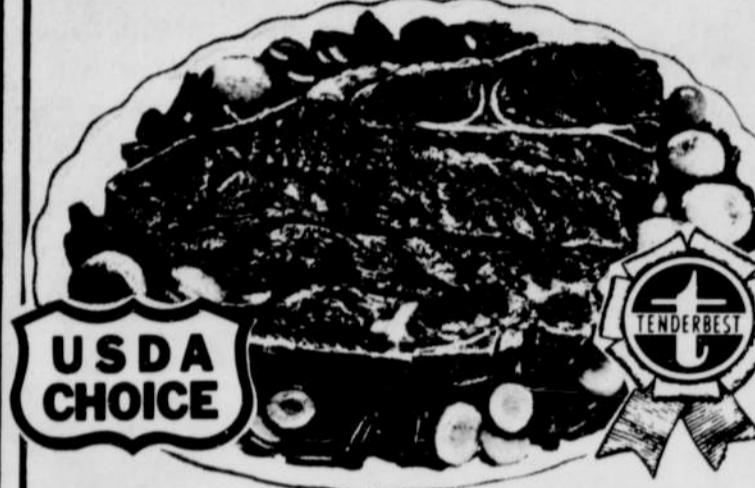

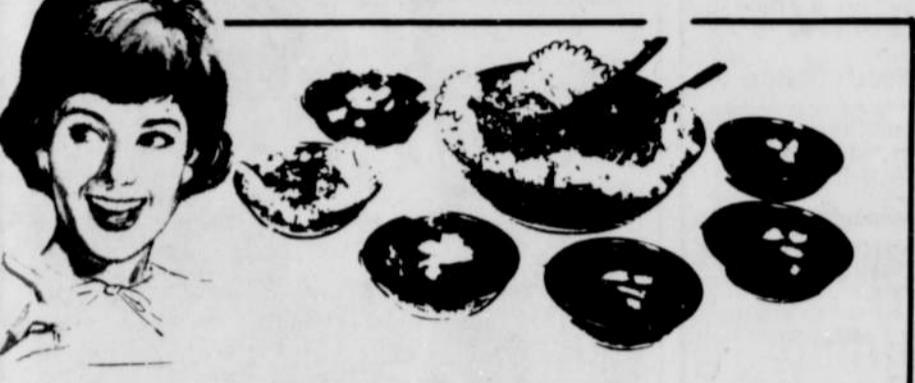
NEWS FROM BIG BEND
