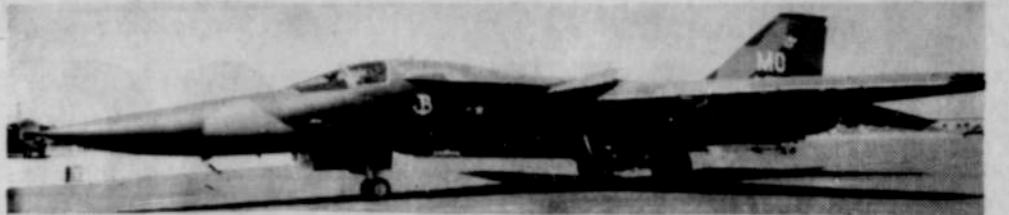
Service officer, Joe Maughn of Nyssa gave an interesting talk on Social Security income for senior citizens.

MT. HOME AFB, IDAHO-- Twenty aircraft and 360 men are deploying from the 347th Tactical Fighter Wing, Mt. Home AFB, Idaho to Cannon AFB, N. M. in the largest deployment of F-111s in the aircraft's history. Complete resurfacing of the base's runway is the immediate cause of the exercise.

Colonel Lynwood E. Clark, wing commander, said the base runway will be under repairs for a period of three to four weeks. The men and aircraft deployed to Cannon will continue the training of the aircrews.

A limited flying schedule will be maintained at Mountain Home during the resurfacing with the bulk of the flying to take place over each weekend. The contractor, Quinn-Robbins of Boise, started runway work Monday, July 17.

The deployment of support technicians commenced Thursday and the multi-million dollar attack bombers left Saturday for the flight to their temporary operating base.
