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

# 1970s U.S. Marshal Encounters Fewer Hazards For More Pay

The job isn't nearly so exciting as when Rooster Cogburn and Wyatt Earp were tracking badmen of the Old West, but it pays more and there is a lot more security.

The 1970s version of the U.S. marshal does not fear for his safety as did his counterpart 100 years ago. Idaho's U.S. Marshal Rex Walters is much more apt to reach for his pen than his gun when a visitor drops by.

The U.S. marshal, travels just as much as his 1800s counterpart, but not in chasing down violators of the law. Today he is likely to have a prisoner in tow for delivery to one of the many federal penitentiaries. Or, more probably, he has a federal court summons in his pocket.

Under him is Chief Deputy Marshal Ed Atwood and five regular deputies. One deputy each is stationed in Pocatello and Coeur d'Alene. In addition, he has an office administrator.

In 1971, the office transported 183 prisoners, served 1,977 processes and disbursed \$350,730.

Three persons assigned to the Idaho marshal's office have been killed in line of duty. The last recorded death was that of Marshal George A. Meffan, who died in July, 1940, in a shootout with a fugitive holed up in a cabin on North Eighth Street Extension.

They were officially established in the new union under the Judiciary Act of 1789. At first they were responsible for service of writs and summons, drawing of bail bonds, custody of criminals, attendance on juries and execution of judgments.

As sheriffs assumed more and more of the law enforcement functions, marshals became exclusively officers of the court.

With the 1789 act, however, a new variety of assignments came their way, most of them with a different boss. They were the census-takers, supervisors of jails for federal prisoners and the executors of court-martials.

The office of the attorney general was handed supervisory power over the marshals in 1861, just about the time the Wild West was coming into its own.

The marshals of those days were both hunter and hunted, their occupation was rendered more dangerous because of widespread hostility toward federal courts.

Prior to 1896 marshals earned their daily bread by collecting fees. At that time they were placed on salaries and allowed expenses incurred on official business.

A U.S. marshal today earns between \$16,000 and \$20,000 annually. He is a political appointee, but retains civil service tenure should he be ousted when a new administration takes office.

He has four main categories of duties: attendance upon court and preserving court-room decorum; service of process; transportation and commitment of prisoners, and disbursing officer within his court district.

Prior to Jan. 1 this year, he was disbursment officer for salaries as well as expenses. That function, insofar as salaries are concerned, is now handled directly by the Department of Justice in Washington.

Service of process includes seizure of goods and chattel, storage of seized articles, sale of property, publication of notices and operation of bul-
