When you're the skipper everyone in the boat takes for granted that you know what you're doing. As the skipper, the lives of the people in your boat are your responsibility. The Coast Guard now offers a home study course called "Skipper". It is designed to acquaint boatmen with the basics of boating, boating safety and federal regulations concerning boat operations.

This programmed learning course is ideal for the boatman who wants to learn more about boating but doesn't have the time to attend a formal boating safety class.
