

Finch—Sarazin Vows Exchanged In Candlelighting Ceremony



Woodland Chapel in Salem was the scene of a wedding June 10, 1972 uniting Lynn Finch and Bruce Sarazin. The 10 a.m. double-ring ceremony was solemnized by the Rev. Albert Cameron of the Chapel, in the presence of 40 relatives and close friends.

On the altar was a white family Bible and a large yellow wedding candle. As part of the ceremony the bride and groom each held a smaller lighted candle, then lit the large candle, this signified their being united as one.

Stained glass windows and a planter of shrubs and multi-colored flowers, the length of one wall, added to the Chapel decor. Traditional wedding music was played by Charlene Heider.

She carried a bridal bouquet of white mums, yellow rosebuds, and yellow straw flowers interspersed with greenery and ribbons.

When the couple left for a wedding trip along the Oregon and California coast, the bride wore a yellow sleeveless dress accented with green buttons.

Both the new Mr. and Mrs. Sarazin are 1968 graduates of Nyssa High School. The bride is a 1972 graduate of Oregon College of Education.
