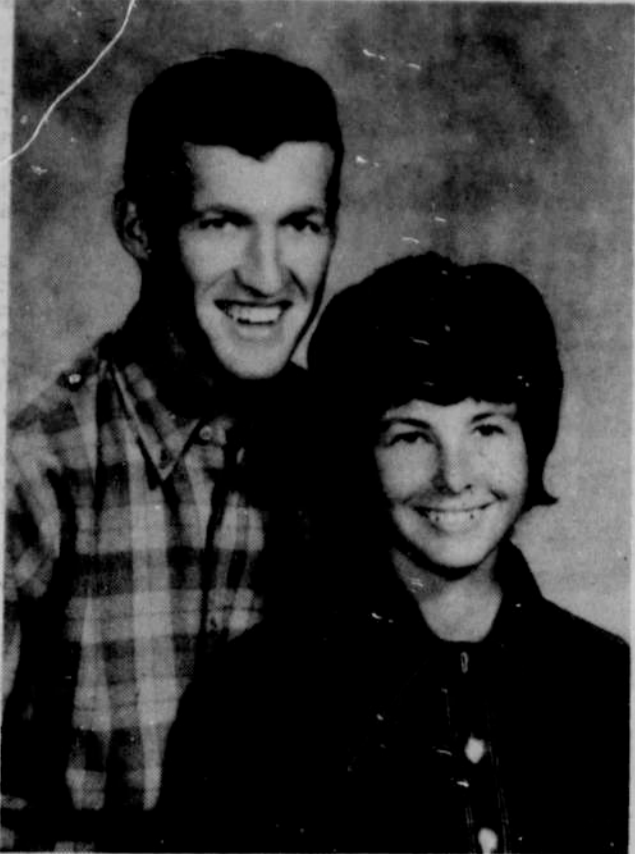


Engagement Announced

Adrian Community Church Holds 30th Anniversary Service

A large crowd which included members of the Presbyterian Church of Roswell attended the 11 a.m. 30th Anniversary service Sunday, July 23 and the potluck dinner which followed on the Church lawn. The Rev. Elmer Rosenkilde of Nampa, a former minister, took part in the service.

Prelude music was played by Helen Bishop, organist and Mrs. James Phifer, pianist. A vocal trio and duet was given during the service by Mrs. Bill Looney's Junior High Class.

The Rev. Raymond Wilson, present pastor gave the sermon entitled "The Church of Adrian." Included in the service, he read a letter written in 1908 by the Rev. Gordon Houston of Nyssa to friends back east which included the following:

"While this is a new country, it is not the wild and woolly west so often pictured--back in the hills and on the ranges there are still some of the rough element, the cowboys, (buckaroos, as they call them here) and sheep herders who often true to type are rough, carousing, and untamed, but usually kind at heart. It takes care and forethought to make money at irrigation and only steady and industrious people are long held. The average rancher is better read, more progressive and broader minded than the average farmer that I met in New York state. Religiously, there is a larger proportion of them that will plow on Sunday, but there is also a larger proportion of them that have family prayers. In other words, they have "more go" whether its "go plow" or "go pray."

Some of the history of the Adrian church was presented also. Services were held in the Kingman Colony School from the time it was built until the Adrian High School was built in 1939. In those early years, any minister who either volunteered or could be persuaded to preach conducted the services.

The Church was organized in 1943 under the name of Kingman Memorial Community Church (United Presbyterian) and became a part of the United Presbyterian Church of North America and was partially supported by the Home Mission board until July 1952.

The Rev. John C. Nivin was minister from June 1942 until September 1946. A building fund was started then. In July 1948, the Church was finished and dedicated and the mortgage was burned in 1951.

The late Rev. Henry Moore followed as minister until 1961. Gerard Kuiper served until 1963 and left to become a teacher in the Johnston C. Smith Seminary. He was followed by Elmer E. Rosenkilde who served until 1969, then retired and lives in Nampa. The present pastor, Raymond Wilson has served since May of 1970, on a plan of sharing a minister with Sterry Memorial Presbyterian Church in Roswell, developed by the National Missions Committee of Presbytery.

Harold Kurtz of the Adrian Church who entered Missionary service in 1955 in Ethiopia, where he and his wife Polly continue to serve with the Church's help was also given mention at the services.

Throughout the years, the church at Adrian has given a portion of its money to help other churches and to support the missions. The church also sponsors all phases of Boy and Girl Scouts. It also provides its building facilities for many community activities. It is truly a community church.

Following the potluck dinner the afternoon was spent visiting. The Rev. Wilson also showed slides of pictures taken a number of years ago. The group enjoyed trying to guess who the people were in the pictures.

Paiute Indians

Seek Status

Congressman Al Ullman's legislation to give official status to the Paiute Indian Colony near Burns has been approved by the House Indian Affairs Sub-committee, a committee spokesman announced today.

The bill seeks to place some 760 acres of land in a "trust" status for the Indians so that they can manage and improve their property under the same laws and regulations governing typical tribal property.

Although the Indians have lived in the Burns area for

nearly 100 years, Ullman said, their status as a tribal organization with specific land rights has always been unclear.

He said the Indians have never been able to participate in federally backed housing and employment programs because they have had no legal claim to the land and no property base from which to work.

"The colony's housing is in bad shape and no funds have

been made available for job training," Ullman said. "These are critical tools the Indians must have in order to live and compete in our world today."

According to the committee spokesman, the bill should receive full Interior Committee approval next week so that it can be brought to the floor of the House before the recess for the Republican National Convention August 18.
