Oregon Cattlemen Request Congressional Help

"3,000 member Oregon Cattlemen's Association sent telegrams today to the Oregon Congressional Delegation asking that they support amendments to the Export Administration Control Act, sponsored by Senator Carl Curtis, R-Nebaska, limiting restrictions of agricultural export products, without Secretary of Agriculture approval." Donald Ostensoe, Executive Vice-President of the OCA stated in his speech before the Gresham Chamber of Commerce, (Monday noon, July 31, The Garden Village Restaurant). The Executive of the state Cattlemen's Association said that Senator Curtis's legislation would specify that any export affecting agricultural commodities effected after July 1, 1972, would cease to be affected. If enacted by Congress, it would void the export restrictions placed on cattle hides which was recently put into effect by Secretary of Commerce Peterson. "I see no way how the restrictions on cattle hide exports, could possibly make a useful contribution to: 1. Contain inflation. 2. Reduce the price of beef at the retail level. 3. Reduce the retail price of domestic shoes." Ostensoe said that "The beef cattle industry of Oregon and the nation is tired of being the whipping boy once again, and having to 'pay the bill' under the threat of domestic tanners and shoe manufacturers, that they must raise shoe prices if something isn't done to restrict the export of domestic cattle hides". The American consumer should be made aware of some facts. Approximately 25 pairs of shoes can be made from one hide. Thus, there is less than \$1.00's worth of cattle hide in each pair of shoes made. This, even if the price of cattle hides were cut in half, which they won't be, it would have little or no effect on the price the consumer pays for his shoes." Ostensoe continued, "I am amazed that a major department of our Government, the Commerce Department, is taken in by a very smooth strategy of the well healed shoe manufacturing industry who is trying to put the blame on the beef producers for the increased cost of shoes. Why doesn't the Commerce Department look at the labor costs as well as the profit margins of shoe manufacturers. If the Commerce Department doesn't, maybe the consumer should take a hard look into this industry. "This is the second big economic blow that the cattle producer and feeder have received within one month from our Federal Government. First, they knock-out the beef import quota system so that an unlimited amount of foreign beef can come into this country. Our Association stated several weeks ago that this action would also be of little notice to the consumer at the retail beef counters. However, it very possibly could be very damaging to the beef producer. Now, "the beef cattle Executive said, "they want to restrict hide exports, which will definitely bring a reduction in hide prices, which again hurts only the producer and feeder, but again will make little or no difference to the price of shoes to the consumer at the retail level.
