### SPEAKING OF BOOKS

Last week I mentioned specifically a novel by James Michener; this week I should like to take another tried and true storyteller and talk about his latest novel. The respected writer of popular fictionalized biography is Irving Stone. Many of you will recall Irving Stone's earlier novels, THE AGONY AND THE ECSTASY, which dealt with the life and times of Michelangelo; and LUST FOR LIFE, which dealt with the adventures of the artist VanGogh.

This time Stone has chosen the life story of Freud and titled his book, THE PASSIONS OF THE MIND. It is the story of an extraordinary man who is one of Vienna's most distinguished neurologists--Sigmund Freud.

He gave up a life of respectability and affluence to become a daring researcher of uncharted seas in an effort to change forever man's understanding of himself, his motivations, and his world. He was a pioneer explorer of the dark and fearsome frontiers of the sexual nature of man.

THE PASSIONS OF THE MIND takes the reader back to Freud's obscure beginnings, his development as a promising pathologist; his training under a famous neurologist in Paris, his training in hypnosis in France; and then the slow, shattering discovery of the unconscious and the science of psychoanalysis.

There are delightful portraits of Freud's wife, Martha Bernays, and of the witty Tante Minna, who lived with them; of his close friends and followers, Lou Andreas-Salome, mistress of the poet Rilke, and the philosopher, Nietzsche; Princess Marie Bonaparte of Greece who ransomed him from the Nazis; and his small band of disciples: Alfred Adler, Ernest Jones, A.A. Brill, and the man Freud chose to become his successor, Carl Jung.

Freud shocked the society of his time with his theories of the sexual origins of neuroses. Mr. Stone leads us convincingly into this hitherto little known world, showing through hundreds of incredible, interwoven cases the astounding new scientific and human horizons that have been opened up.

THE PASSIONS OF THE MIND is a novel as big as its subject. It brings us as a participant into the life and career of a bold one, Sigmund Freud, who proved that some of the most exciting challenges are not met on the battlefield or on icy mountain peaks, but inside the heart and mind of an individual human being.

I can vividly remember reading about Freud in psychology textbooks but until I read this fascinating novel I did not really appreciate the influence and capabilities of the man, Freud.

### TEXTILE ENTRIES

This year there will be Junior, Intermediate, and Senior divisions in the textile division at the Malheur County Fair. According to Elaine Russell of Vale, chairman of the Textile Division. Juniors are 11 years of age and under, Intermediates are 11 to 18 and Seniors are 18 years of age and older.

Exhibitors should remember the judges consider the stems, foliage, and freshness of the flowers in judging. Flowers exhibit best if picked late in the afternoon and placed in deep, room temperature water overnight.

Black containers will be furnished for floral exhibits. Town and Country Garden Club from Nyssa will be in charge of registration of exhibits.

Exhibitors will find a division included in the Fair book where Art objects and flower arrangements are combined for display.

## Bank Debits Up

Bank debits for the 8 reporting banks including Harney and Malheur counties were up in June, 1972, compared to June, 1971; the University of Oregon Bureau of Business and Economic Research has reported.

Debits for June, 1972, totaled \$53,702,000. For May, 1972, the total was \$54,680,000 and for June, 1971, the total was \$49,807,000.

Oregon with 395 banks reporting had a percentage increase of 7.6% in June, 1972, as compared with May, 1972, and a 19.3% decrease in June, 1972, compared with June, 1971.

Total bank debits for June 1972, came to \$6,843,394,000. For May, 1972, the total was \$6,362,048,000 and for June, 1971, the total was \$5,736,770,000.

## Oregon Traffic Deaths Highest In July Records

Eighty-one people died in Oregon traffic during July. It was the worst toll recorded for that month in the state's history, according to the Motor Vehicles Division, and pushed the state's seven-month traffic toll to 423, compared with 362 for the same period a year ago.

Despite the increase so far this year, the state still has a chance to at least reduce the rate of increase over last year if August traffic deaths can be kept at or below the five-year average of 65. Last year, August traffic crashes killed 96 people, the worst monthly toll in the state's history.

Although complete reports are still not available, at least 13 July victims died when they were thrown from their vehicles at the time of impact. Four of these were known to have had seat belts in their cars, but they were not using them at the time of accident. At least 11 other victims died inside their vehicles "while sitting on their seat belts."

"If individual Oregonians really want to do something to reduce traffic deaths," an agency spokesman said, "the best thing they can do is make certain everyone is buckled up before the car starts moving."
