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NYSSA GIRL KILLED IN THREE CAR ACCIDENT, LOCAL DRIVER CHARGED

Mrs. Lucinda Bratton Cook of Fort Lewis, Washington, died August 14, 1972 at the Holy Rosary Hospital in Ontario, from injuries received in a car accident three miles south of Cairo Junction, August 13. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Bratton of rural Nyssa.

Mrs. Cook was operating a vehicle, in which her husband Donald Cook, 24, also of Fort Lewis, her sister Debra Bratton, 15, Nyssa; and two Nyssa girls, Laura Jensen, 16, and Lynn Ashby, 16, were passengers. Cook was treated at Holy Rosary Hospital and released and Miss Bratton was treated

for shock at Malheur Memorial Hospital and released. Miss Ashby and Miss Jensen received out-patient treatment at the Nyssa hospital.

The Cook vehicle was southbound when hit by a car driven by Pablo Garza, 27, Nyssa who was north bound and attempting to pass another northbound car driven by James Hughes, 54, Nampa. The Garza car apparently was braked and crashed into the left side of the Hughes vehicle then skidded into the southbound lane. The Hughes car was knocked off the east side of the highway and the Garza car bounced back into the northbound lane.

Hughes and his passengers were not injured. Garza was charged with hit-and-run, later was bailed out of the Malheur County Jail. Garza's passenger, Diane Woodley, 25, Mountain Home was issued a citation for allowing an unlicensed driver to operate a vehicle. Hughes was cited for driving without a driver's license.

Miss Woodley was treated for minor injuries at the Holy Rosary Hospital and released.

Cooper Joins Nyssa Police

Richard S. Cooper, a 1969 graduate of Nyssa High School, has recently been appointed to the Nyssa Police Department as a patrolman, according to Police Chief Alvin Allen.

Cooper is married to the former Patricia Hale, and they reside at 808 Locust Avenue. She is the daughter of Mrs. Jean Davis, Nyssa and his parents are Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Cooper.

The new police officer has been a member of the Nyssa Police Reserve since January of this year, and is a qualified Ambulance Attendant (Emergency Medical Technologist). He has been on the staff at Malheur Memorial Hospital since graduation from high school.

Allen said that Cooper plans to attend classes at TVCC this fall in Police Science. All officers on the Nyssa force have completed this course, and it is part of required professional training for local police officers.

Garza Arraigned In Nyssa Court

Pablo Garza, 27, of Nyssa, was arraigned before Judge E. Otis Smith in Nyssa Justice Court Monday, August 14 on a charge of hit and run stemming from an accident August 13 in which Mrs. Lucinda Cook was killed. Garza had been arrested by Oregon State Police following the accident and had posted bail.

Judge Smith said Garza asked for a court-appointed attorney and the case was continued to a preliminary hearing. Committed to the Malheur County jail to await the preliminary appearance, bail was set at \$2,500 and Garza posted a surety bond before he was released from custody.

Hit and run in Oregon, according to the judge, is a class C felony and carries a maximum sentence of five years in the state penitentiary, or a maximum fine of \$5,000, or both.

RED CROSS BLOOD DRAWING AUGUST 23

There will be a blood drawing, August 23, held in the Eagles Hall from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. Women of the Lutheran Church will be the hostess group with baby sitting provided by the Girl Scouts. The quota is again 150 pints. Last drawing, April 26, only brought in 100 pints, so the need to meet the quota is especially important this time.

The average person has a blood volume equal to about 8% of his or her body weight thus, the blood volume for a person weighing 110 pounds would be approximately 8 pints.

For a person weighing 150 pounds, it would be 11 pints. Men have a slightly higher volume than women. The structure and function of blood cells and plasma are essentially the same among all ethnic groups and can readily be interchanged. A person in good health between the ages of 18 and 61 can be a donor. They can donate every two months but not more than five times a year. For the safety of both the donor and the recipient of the blood, the medical history of each donor is checked by a registered nurse. Blood pres-

NEW WORLD TABLE TENNIS RECORD SET BY TWO NYSSA ATHLETES

A new world record for table tennis was set in Nyssa last weekend, surpassing the previous record by four hours.

Setting the record were Tom Church, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Church, and Dan Kane, son of Glen Kane, Nyssa. Both boys will be juniors at Nyssa High School this fall.

The two boys read about the previous record in a Portland newspaper, set by Robert Hinkel and Charles Holing, both 16, of Lake Oswego, Oregon. These boys played table tennis for 32 hours and five minutes, beating the record of two Frenchmen by one hour.

Knowing what they had to do to set a new record, Church and Kane set their sights on 36 hours. They began play at 9 a.m. Friday, August 11, and finished at 11:10 p.m. Saturday.

The total elapsed time was 38 hours and 10 minutes, with time for rest stops, a little food and one shower deducted to make playing time 36 hours and five minutes.

The boys played a total of 135 games that were actually scored, and the rest of the time was spent volleying back and forth, shooting for targets, and just keeping the ball in play.

During the course of the 38 hour stint over 100 persons signed the guestbook, there was always at least two persons in attendance, and newsmen and photographers came and went to make the record "official".

Leg-weary and barely able to keep awake, the boys were still remarkably spry at the finish. When asked if they thought their record would hold up, Tom replied that "records were made to be broken".

School Fees Announced

High School Principal Gene Chester said that registration for the 1972-73 school year will be held August 28 and 29, the first days of school. He listed the fees which will be required, and said that students should be prepared to pay them at registration.

New high school students in the area who have not attended Nyssa Schools before may come in any day next week, August 21 to 25, with the exception of Tuesday to pre-register. This will save time at the regular registration period.

Book fee is \$8.00, Accounting fee \$2.00, Towel fee \$2.00, Locker fee 50¢, Agriculture Shop fee \$2.00, Industrial Arts Shop fee \$2.00, Homemaking fees \$2.00 freshmen, others \$1.00.

The cost of an Activity Ticket is \$5.00 which entitles the students to membership in the student body, subscription to the school paper, admission to musical programs and all regularly scheduled home athletic contests, and reduced admission to athletic events away from home.

Student insurance, which is optional, is \$6.00. This covers school attendance and sports competition in all sports except tackle football and skiing. Football insurance is \$18.00.

Chester said that football practice gets underway August 21, and all students participating in athletics must have insurance, either school or acceptable insurance from another source.

Dan Martin, junior high principal, listed their fees as follows: Fees, \$4.00; insurance \$4.00 and football insurance \$10.00.

Lunch tokens for junior high and high school are 30¢. Regulation physical education clothing can be purchased at Brackens' or Wilsons' Department Stores, and should be marked with the student's name in permanent ink.
