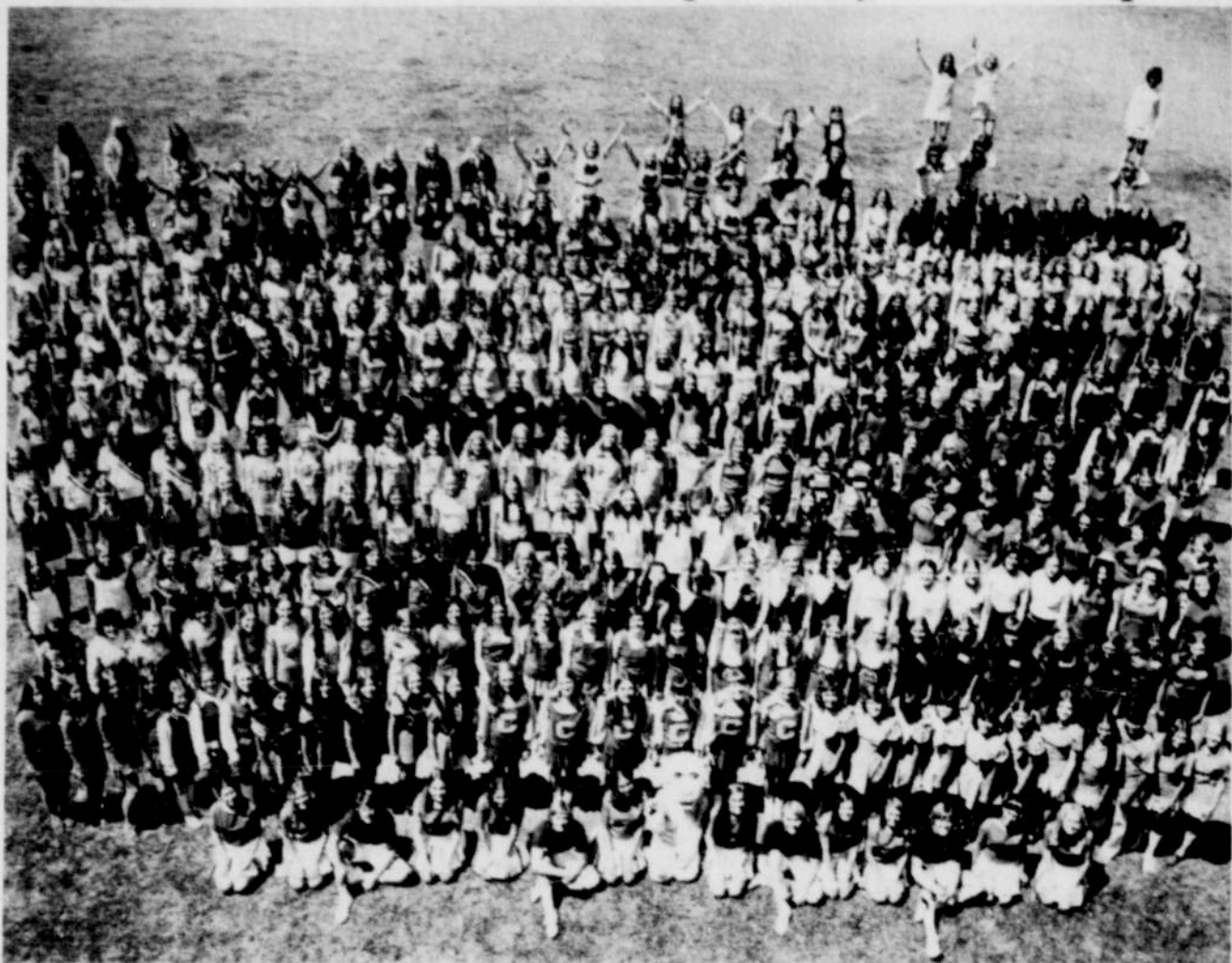


Nyssa Students Attend Speciality Workshop

The energetic high schoolers traveled from all parts of Utah, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and Nevada to attend the workshop which is the largest of its kind in the Intermountain West, said Robert Olmstead, camp coordinator from Palo Alto, California.

Olmstead directs numerous speciality workshops in the Western United States during the summer months. The program is affiliated with the National Cheerleaders Association and a total of 150 workshops in 44 states are held during the students vacation.

Students, both male and female, participated in instruction and competition in cheerleading, drill team, flag team, twirl-

ing, majorette and songleader divisions. The instructors have been invited from schools and associations throughout the United States.

Cheerleaders from Nyssa High School won awards for outstanding performance in their competition against other schools. Ribbons won were two white ribbons for outstanding performance; two red ribbons for excellent performance.

Drill team members were put into groups to make up and perform in drills and drilling formations. Mardi Cole won two superior cards for parade drill and field drill. She also won two first place ribbons for close order drill and dance drill. Marci Myers received third place for count down drill. She won three excellent cards for parade drill.

When asked for their opinion of the workshop, the girls from Nyssa stated that it was a real opportunity to attend the workshop as it taught them how to really support their school. They said they would like to take this opportunity to extend a special thanks to all those in the community who helped them raise the funds needed to attend the camp. They also said that this is just one of the many examples of the residents of Nyssa in the way they support the school and its activities.

TVCC Football Players To Begin Training

Treasure Valley Community College footballers will be on campus by the end of this month to begin training for their season opener against Columbia Basin at home.

Eighteen lettermen are expected to return including seven starters from last year's squad. They are: Greg Enright, a kicker from Medford; Edward Green, a defensive back from Alaska; James Kahoonel, a tailback from Hawaii; Jim Sanders, an end from Ontario; Russell Tipples, a back from Alaska; Donald Tindall, a defensive tackle from Vale; and Johnnie Walton, a center from Ontario.

Other lettermen are Jim Cheatan, an offensive guard of Vale; Steve Hall, a back from Gold Hill; Herman Hull, a linebacker from Ontario; Tama Isaia, a quarterback from Hawaii; Mike Reynolds, an offensive tackle from Alaska; Dale Rippy, a defensive tackle of Merrill; James Samudio, a defensive guard of Port Orford; Mark Shumaker, an offensive guard of Ontario; Steven Tomlinaga, a linebacker from Hawaii; Jerry Walker, a linebacker from Illinois; and John Welker, a defensive back from Washington.

Two other sophomores will join the team for the first time. Kent Adams, of Vale, is transferring from Wyoming, and

Tony Berendse, a basketball standout last year, will turn out for an end position.

Among the freshmen expected to turn out are Pat Echanis of Ontario, Kevin Jones of Newport, Ron Moffis of Nyssa, Rick Myers of Hermiston, Gustave Newmann of Hines, Rick Rowe of Idaho, Christopher Waud of Tillamook, and Dave Westerberg of Ashland.

Coach Farnworth will be looking for replacements for last year's graduates, Ray Peterson, quarterback, and Walter Liverpool, running back.

Two outstanding linebackers graduated. Mark Highbarger and All American Bill Taylor. Another All American, Jerry Sinclair, will also be missed.

According to coach Farnworth, "The season depends a great deal on early development of freshmen who must be called in to replace some of last year's outstanding players."

Line play, both offensively and defensively, is the big question mark!

Skill areas seem to be outstanding with Isaia, Shrum, and Moffis throwing to Sanders, Kahoonel, and a host of freshmen backs.

The schedule is again tough with Columbia Basin, Oregon J.V.'s, and Western Montana being the toughest."

Burl Ives At State Fair

Burl Ives, America's foremost folksinger, has chronicled the songs of all nations from the Old Santa Fe Trail in New Mexico to England, Alaska, Appalachia, the Orient.

And now he is coming to Salem, Oregon, to appear at The Big One, the Oregon State Fair, in the Grandstand Arena Saturday, August 26 and Sunday, August 27 at 8 p.m.

Burl Ives, who was called America's leading minstrel by Carl Sandburg, has been a vagabond and evangelist, traveling the country with a guitar on his back. He reminds his audiences, "It is your land, and it is up to you to keep it unspoiled," a fitting reminder when the theme of the 1972 Oregon State Fair is "A Better Environment Through Forestry."

Bonneville Power Faces Deficit By Next Year

The Federal Columbia River Power System had gross revenues of \$175.5 million in fiscal year 1972 but the net revenues amounted to only \$4.8 million, Bonneville Power Administration announced today.

H.R. Richmond, BPA Administrator, said that although gross revenues were almost \$20 million higher than in fiscal year 1971 and \$28 million higher than in fiscal year 1970, the net revenues were down almost \$10 million from FY71 and almost \$20 million from FY70.

Saturday's concert, made possible through the cooperation of the U. S. Department of the Interior, is a special tribute to the department's Johnny Horizon theme and the heritage of public lands.

Richmond said he expected the System to have a deficit in net revenues in the current fiscal year. BPA, an agency of the U.S. Department of the Interior, is the marketing agent for Columbia River power.

These results are based on unaudited data and are subject to adjustment as a result of the audit by the General Accounting Office, which is now underway.

The FCRPS includes, in addition to the high-voltage transmission facilities of BPA, the hydro-electric dams of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation, plus the Packwood Lake hydro plant and Hanford No. 1 nuclear plant operated by Washington Public Power Supply System.

Richmond pointed out that while gross revenues exceeded the estimate of \$168.7 million, due primarily to greater than expected sales to California utilities and less than anticipated to purchase thermal energy, expenses have been increasing at double the rate at which revenues have been increasing.

It had been anticipated that the FCRPS would operate at a net loss in FY 1972.

Operating costs including wages, cost of materials, etc., continue to rise. Also, costs of thermal power are higher than hydro, which will account for higher operating costs in the future.

"We expect the trend of expenses increasing at double the rate of the revenue increase to continue and, consequently, it appears most probable that we will experience a deficit in FY 1973."

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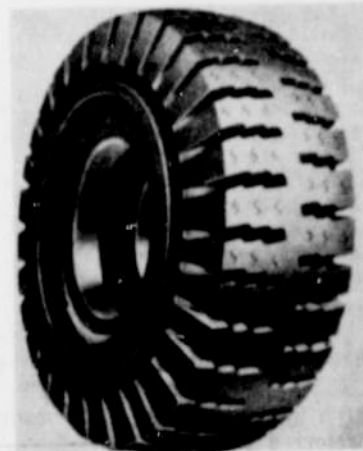
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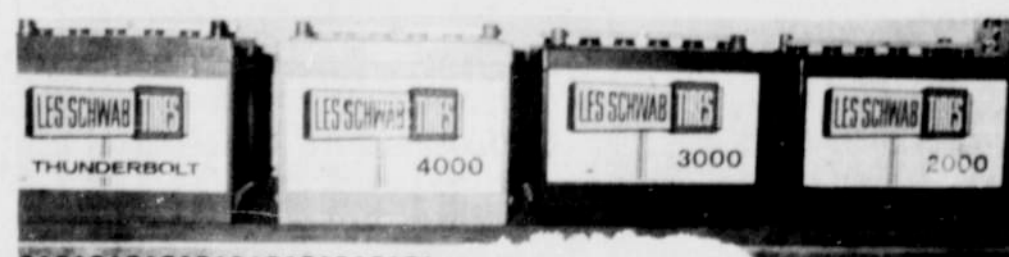
